Music for the occasion will be provided by the graduates who will sing the traditional Benediction hymns. Organ accompaniment will be supplied by Sister Mary Herman, C.D.P.

The Baccalaureate Mass will be celebrated Sunday Morning, May 29, at 8:00 a.m. The seniors will attend Holy Mass and receive Holy Communion in a body attired in cap and gown.

On Sunday morning, June 5, the entire parish will honor the centennial graduates with a breakfast given in their honor. The fifteen grads will be guests-of-honor at this affair sponsored by the Saint Anne Altar

Society. Various members of parish societies will speak and the graduates will be formally introduced into the post-grad society of Holy Family Parish life.

Having successfully completed four years of high school, the graduates eagerly await graduation with feelings of both joy and sadness.

Sister Amabilis' personal appeal and her ability to deal with the problems of high school students has marked her as a true friend and leader.


Our present principal, Sister Mary Barbara, and our Science teacher, Sister Bernard Theresa, are comparatively new but they have also taken their part in shaping our lives.

Former Graduate To Become Priest

The Reverend John J. McGuire, a 1951 graduate of Holy Family High School, will be ordained a priest at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, June 11, at the Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption in Covington by the newly-consecrated Most Reverend Richard Henry Ackerman, C. S. Sp., Bishop of the Diocese of Covington.

The future Father McGuire was ordained a deacon in September at St. Patrick College, Maynooth, Ireland, where he has completed four years of theological training. He will arrive in Ashland within the next few days from Ireland.

The Reverend Mr. McGuire, who is known as "Jack" to his friends in Ashland, is a son of Mrs. Sara E. McGuire of 4332 Ridgeway Avenue, and the late Mr. Carl L. McGuire. Jack was accepted as a student for the priesthood in the Diocese of Covington by the late Most Reverend William T. Mulloy, former Bishop of the Diocese, and will be assigned to duties in the Diocese soon after ordination.

The 27-year-old seminarian received his first four years of training at Saint Mary College, Saint Mary, Kentucky. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in philosophy from Saint Mary in 1956.

Mr. McGuire also attended Xavier University, Cincinnati, Ohio, before entering the seminary.

While in Ireland, the Reverend Mr. McGuire has traveled throughout Europe. He was a visitor to Lourdes during the centennial celebration of the appearance of the Blesed Virgin there, and has traveled to Rome twice.

His first Solemn High Mass will be celebrated Sunday, June 12, at 10:30 a.m. at Holy Family Church. Reverend J. A. Browne, assistant pastor of Saint Patrick Church, Maysville, Kentucky, will be subdeacon at this Mass. Father Browne is also a former graduate of Holy Family High School. Reverend Edward S.
