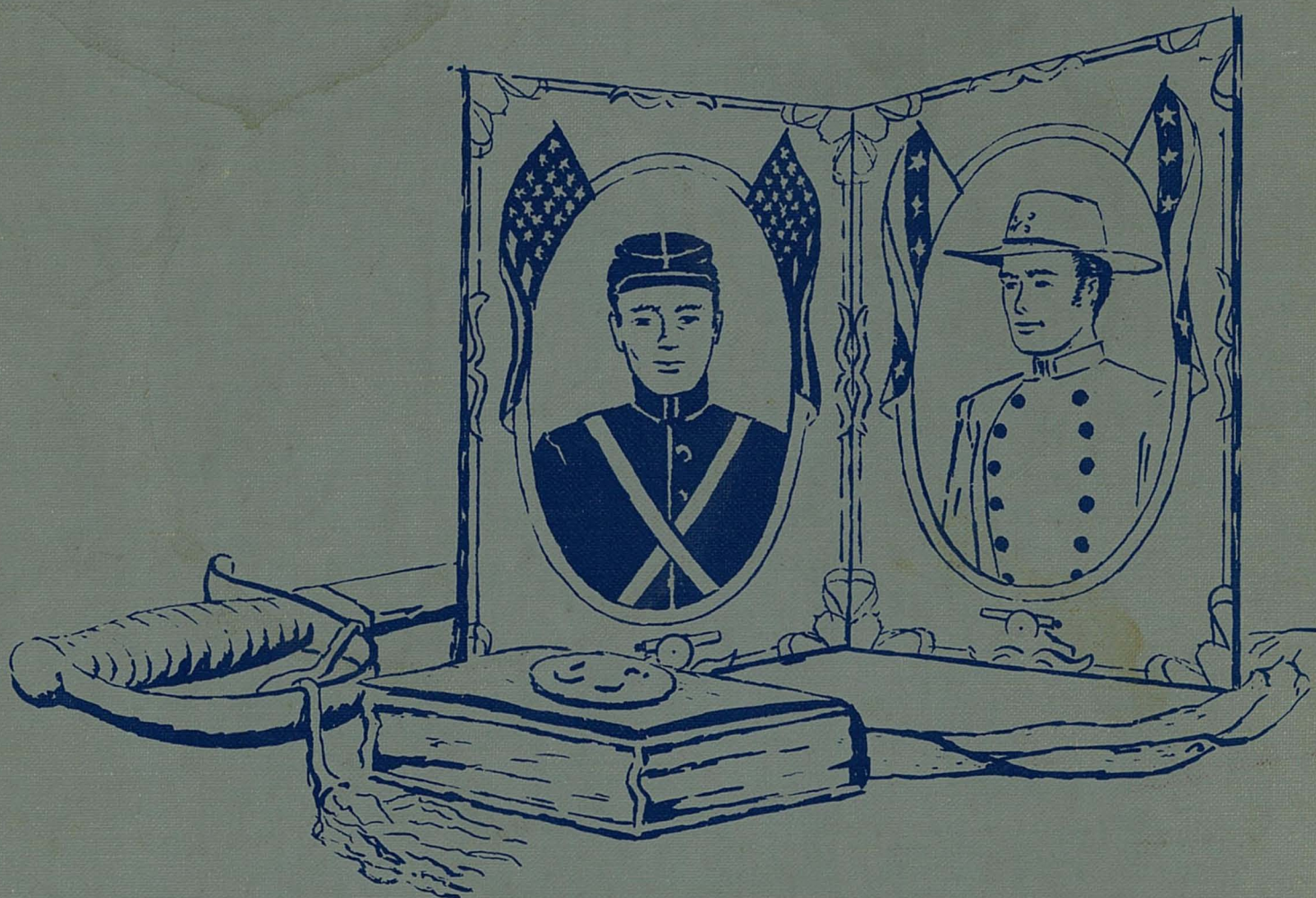

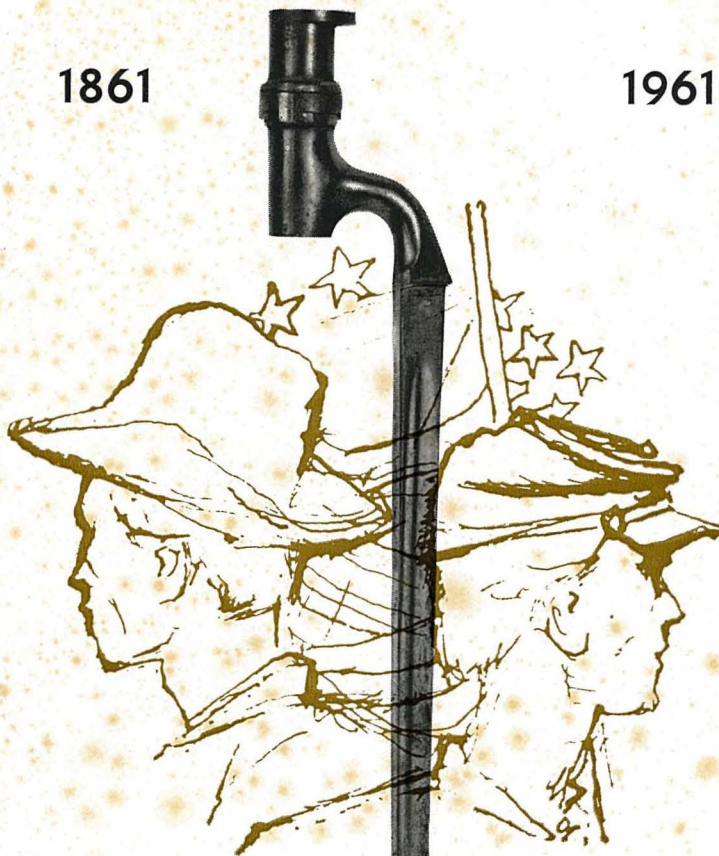

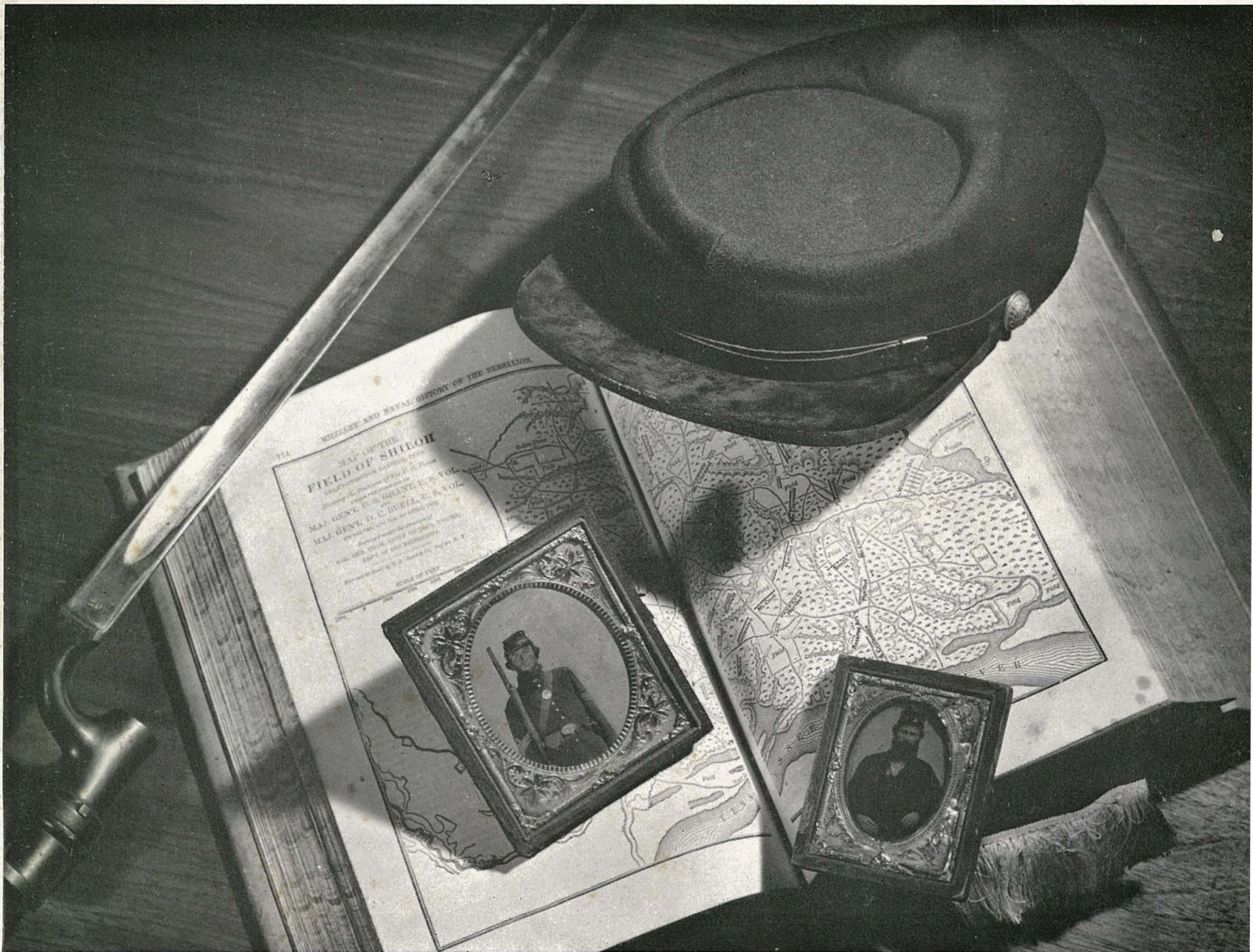
recognized by his own brother of the 19th Ohio Regt.

Rifts caused by the Brothers' War left marks deep on the souls of the state and its people; but the great single event of our history lives on in pain and pageant and, most of all, in unity.









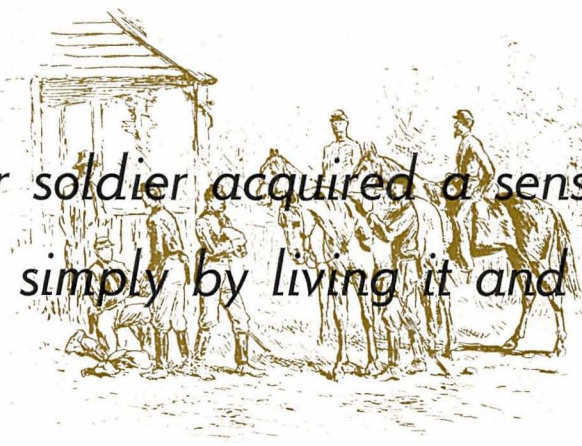

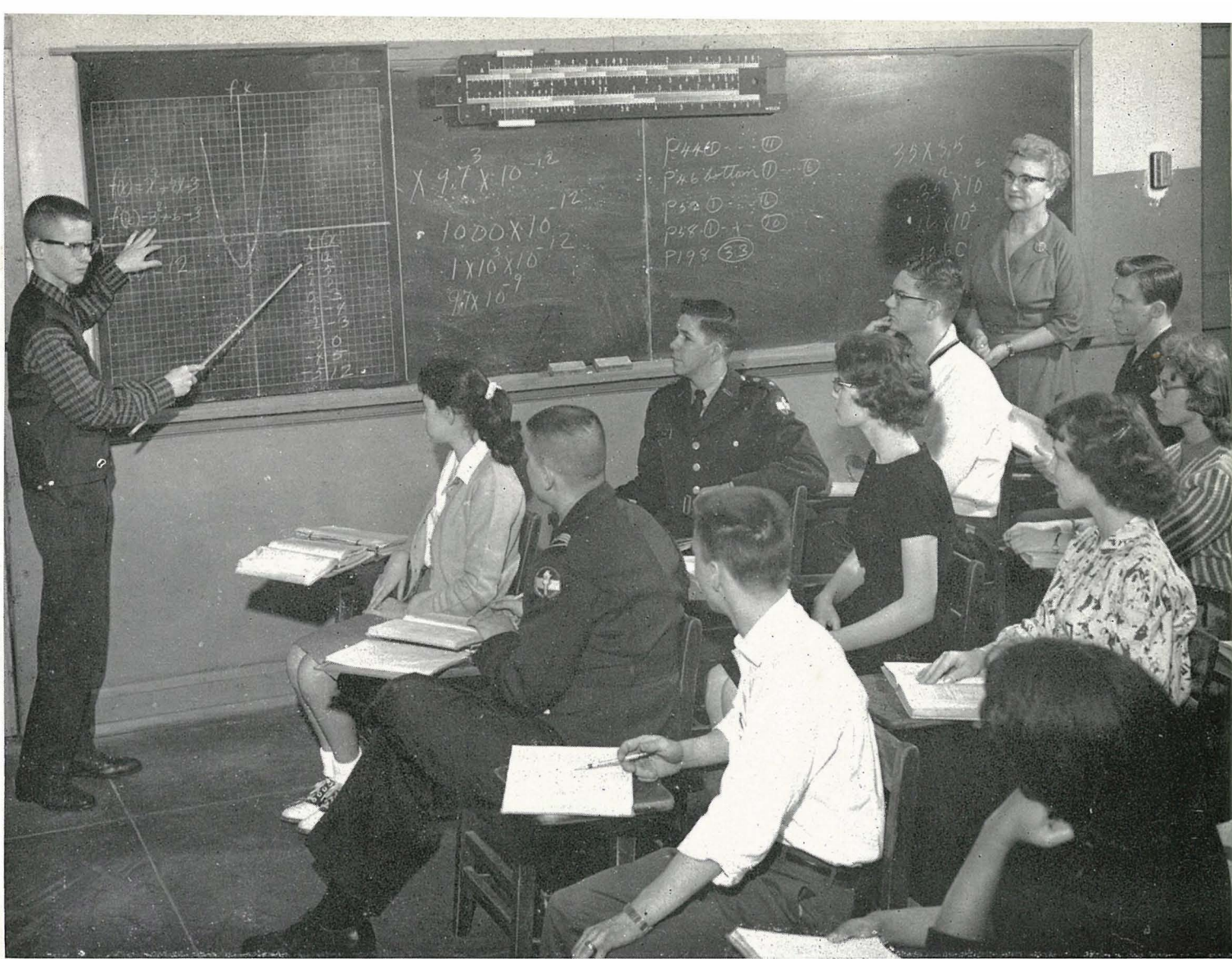

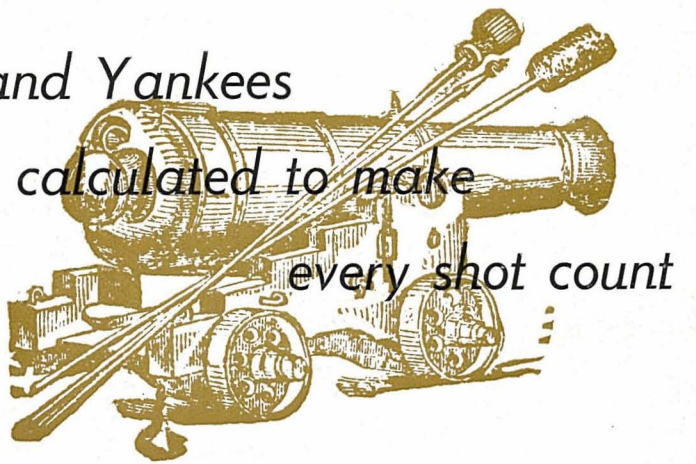

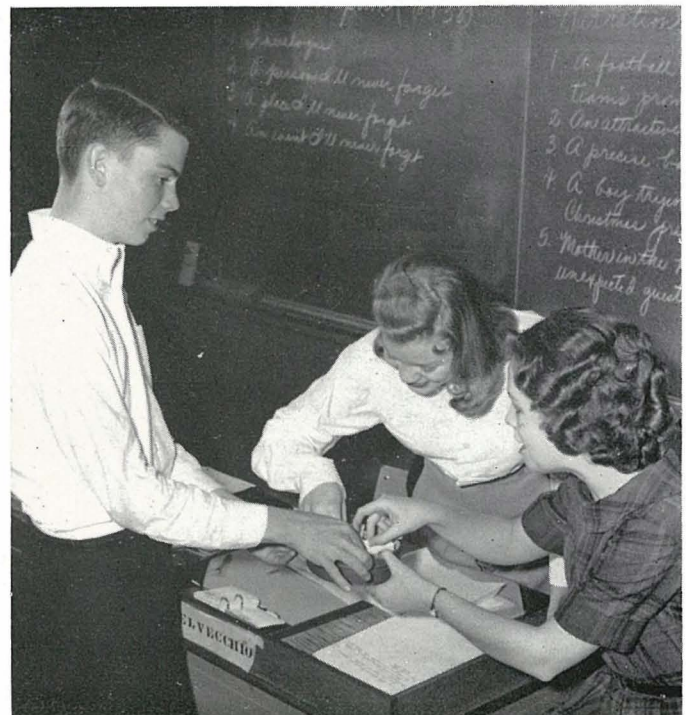


"Let's all get down to work and win the Regional Speech Tournament at Morehead," says John Patton as he hands out informative material.

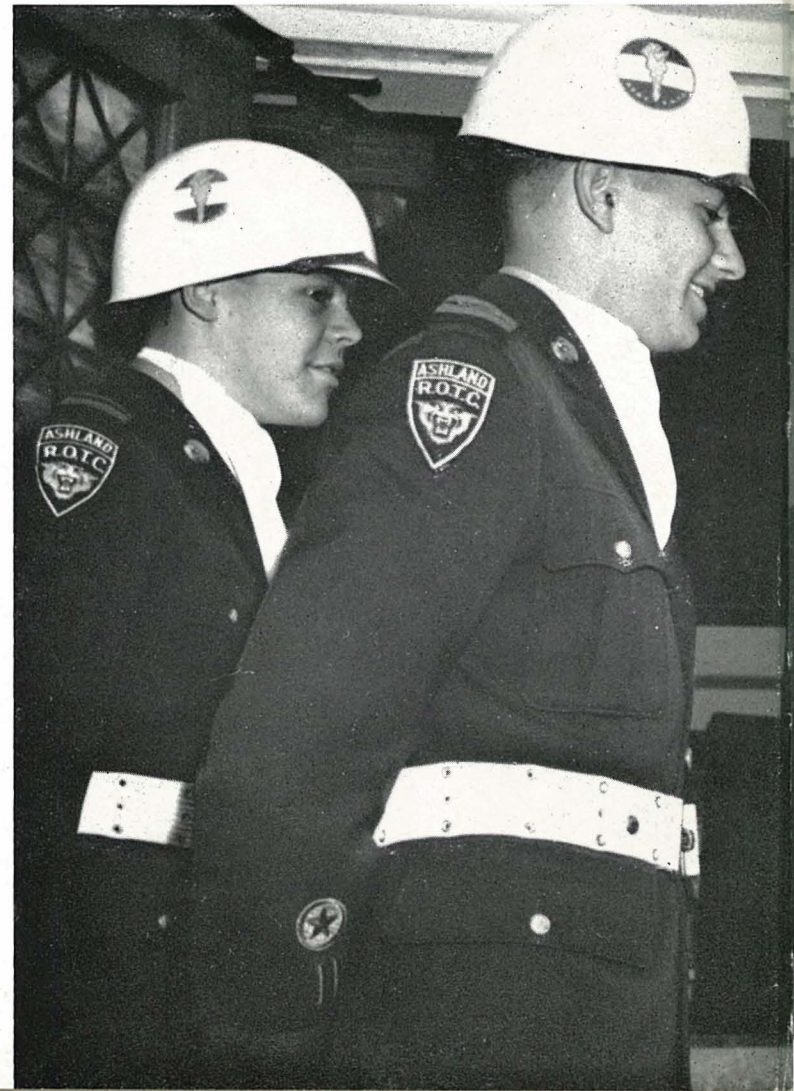

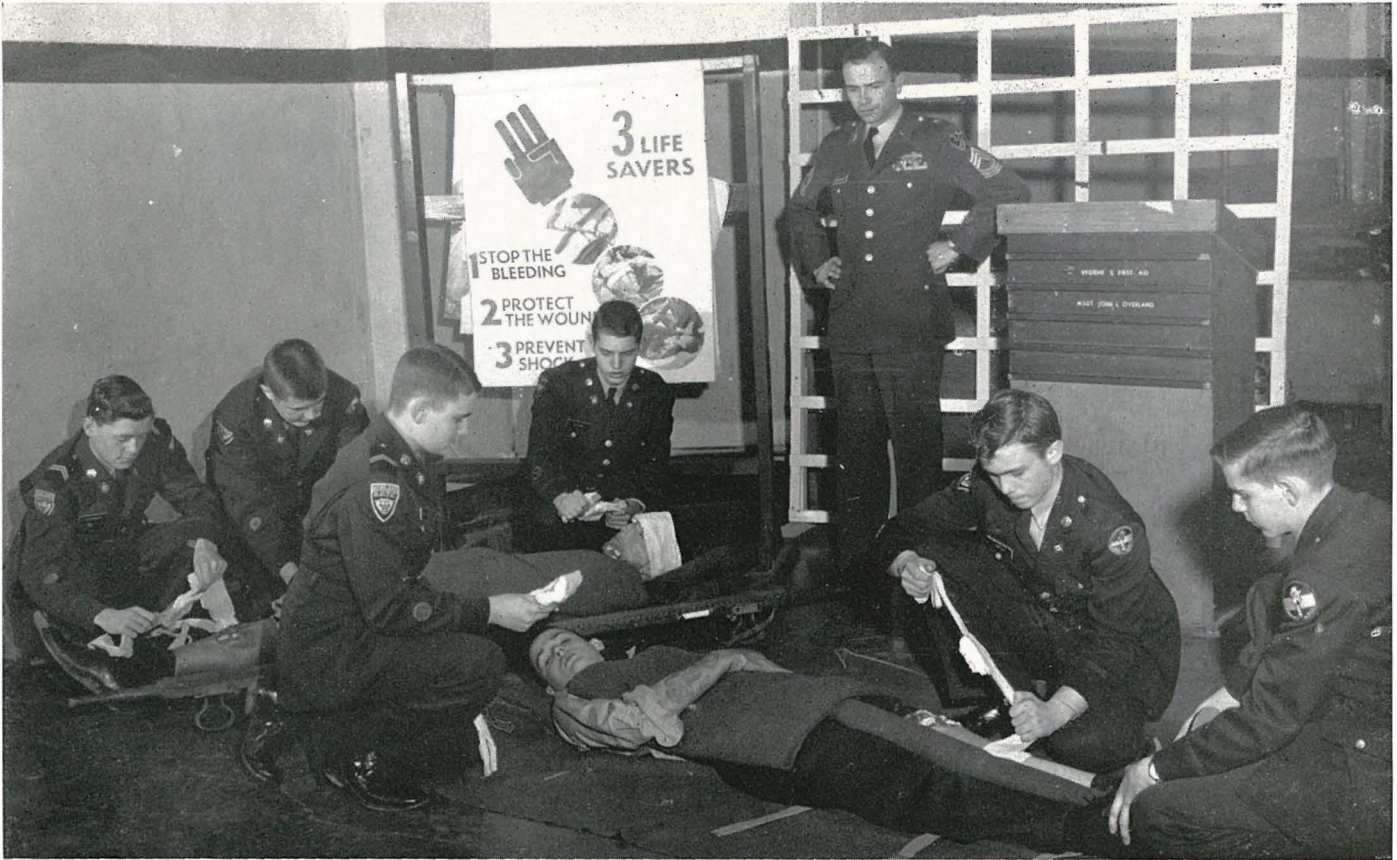

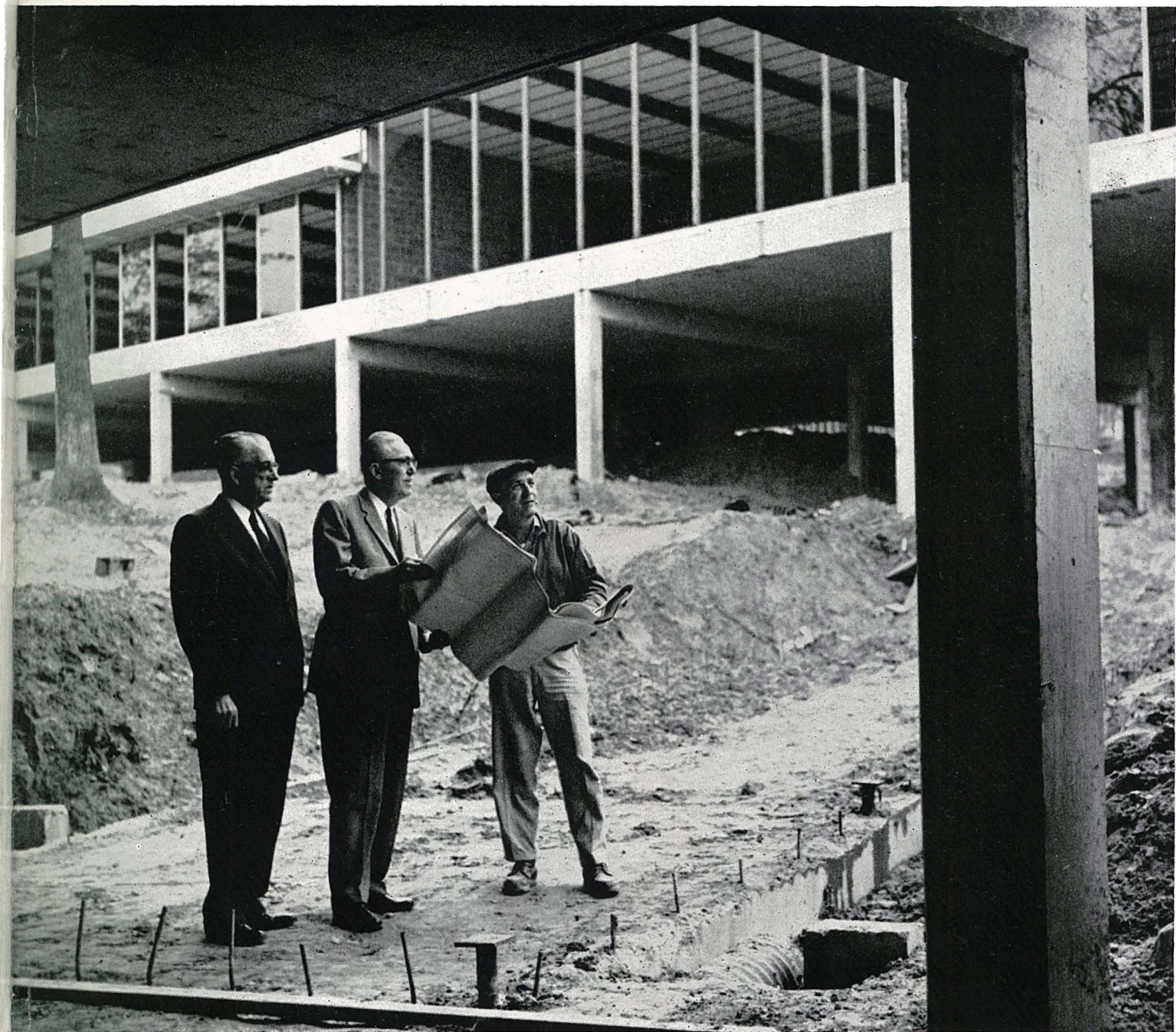

For twenty-nine years Mr. E. W. Mathis, assistant superintendent, has been a vital part of Ashland schools. He taught first in the lower grades and then at Coles Junior High, where he became principal. From there he moved to his present post. He received his B. S. degree from Morehead State College and his M. A. from the University of Kentucky.

Efficient generals direct

Progress in the development of the building program of Ashland Public Schools can be attributed to the efforts of Mr. W. C. Shattles, superintendent of local schools. During his term in office two new grade schools have been completed, and the new Paul G. Blazer campus type high school is well under construction, but it will probably not be ready for occupancy until the fall of 1962. Improvements and additions have also been made in many of the older buildings. Before assuming his present position, Mr. Shattles was assistant principal and dean of boys at Ashland High School. He also served as assistant superintendent. His college work was done at Western State College and Marshall College where he received his A. B. and M. A. degrees respectively.

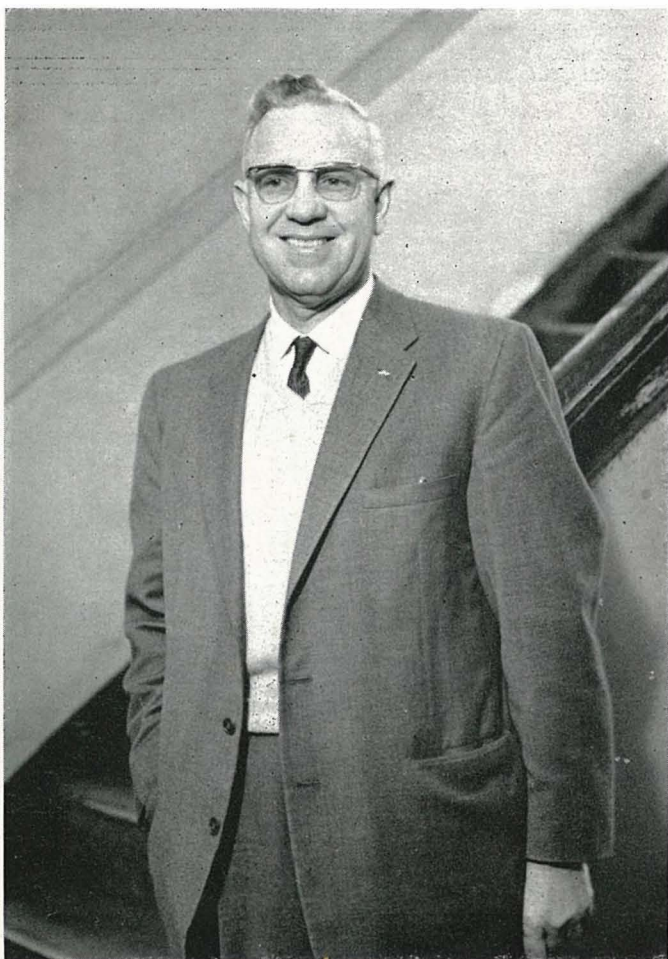

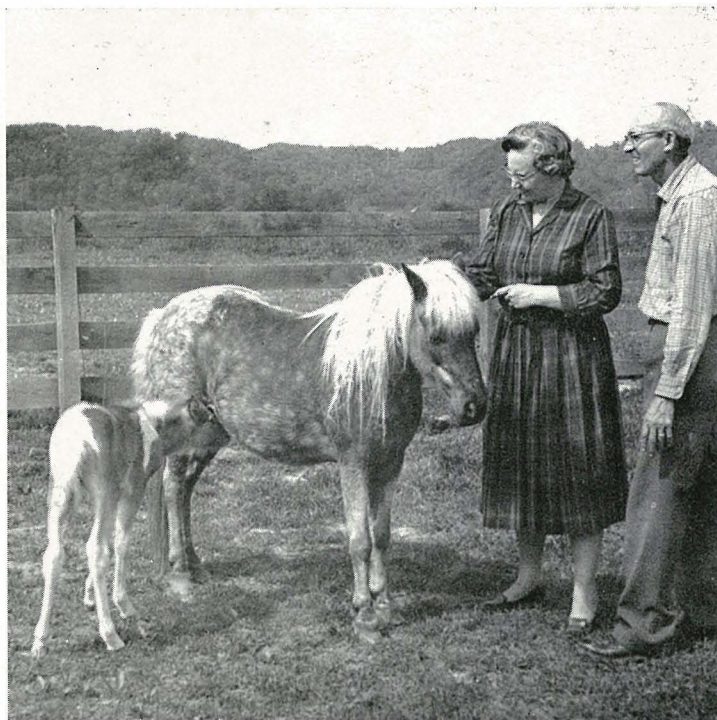

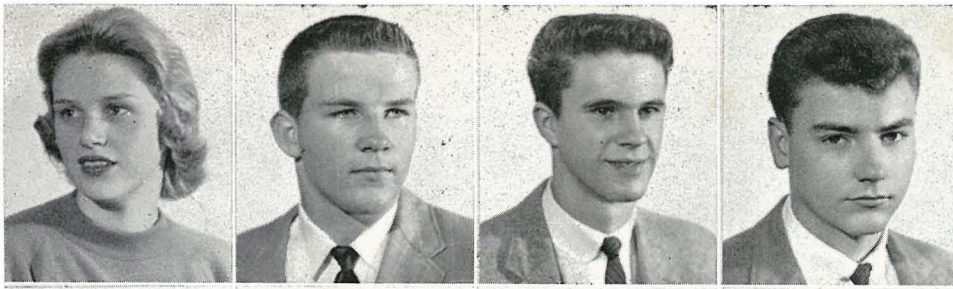

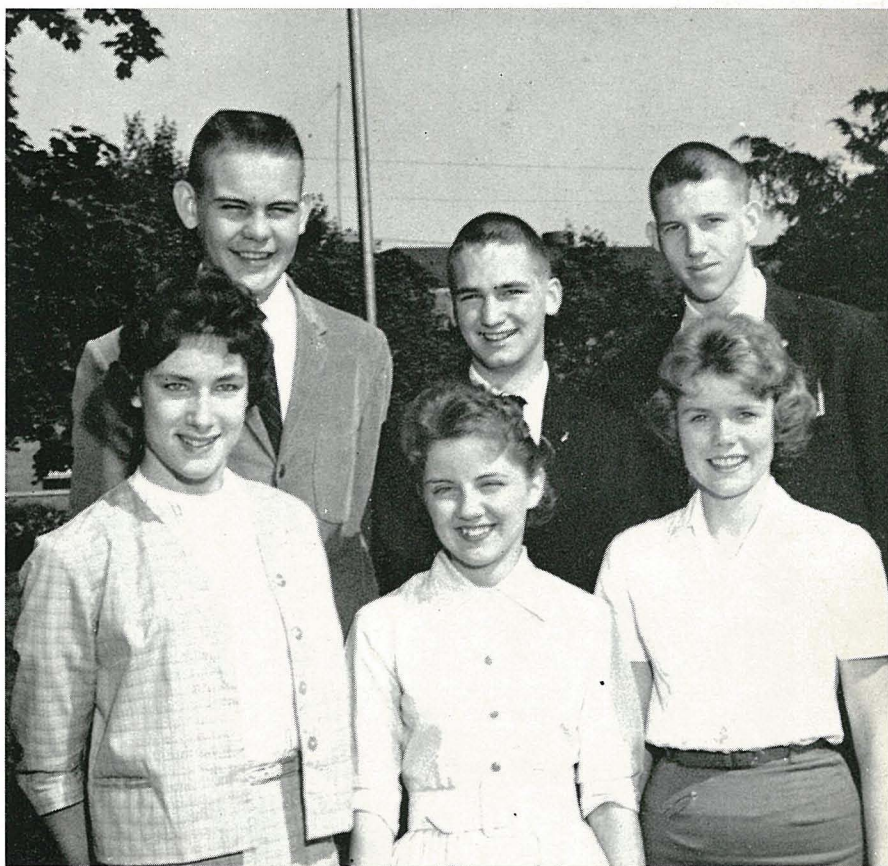

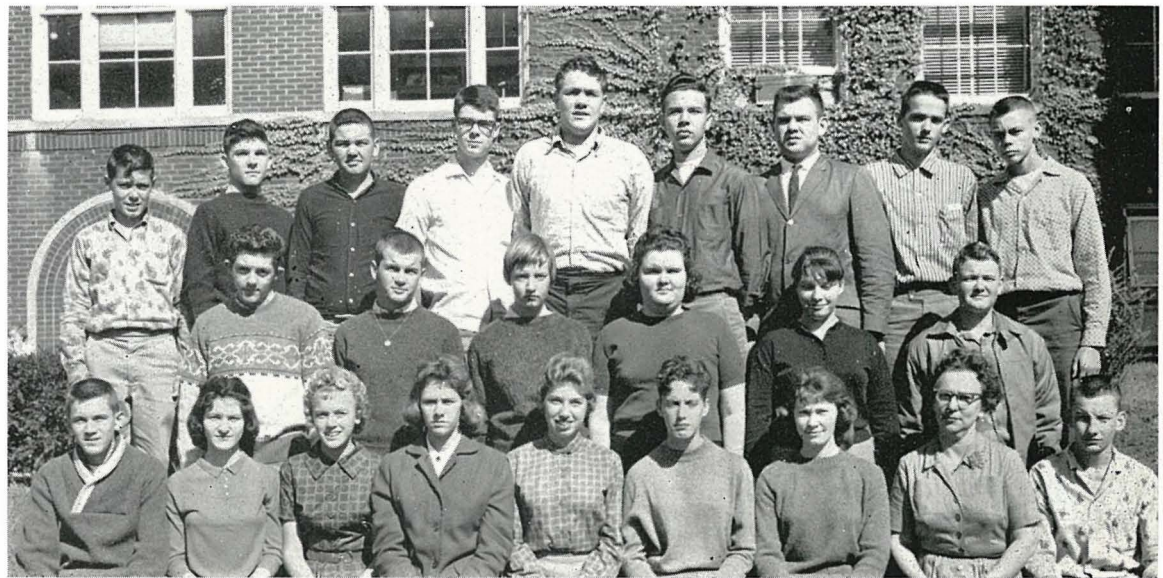

Alpha Beta Club

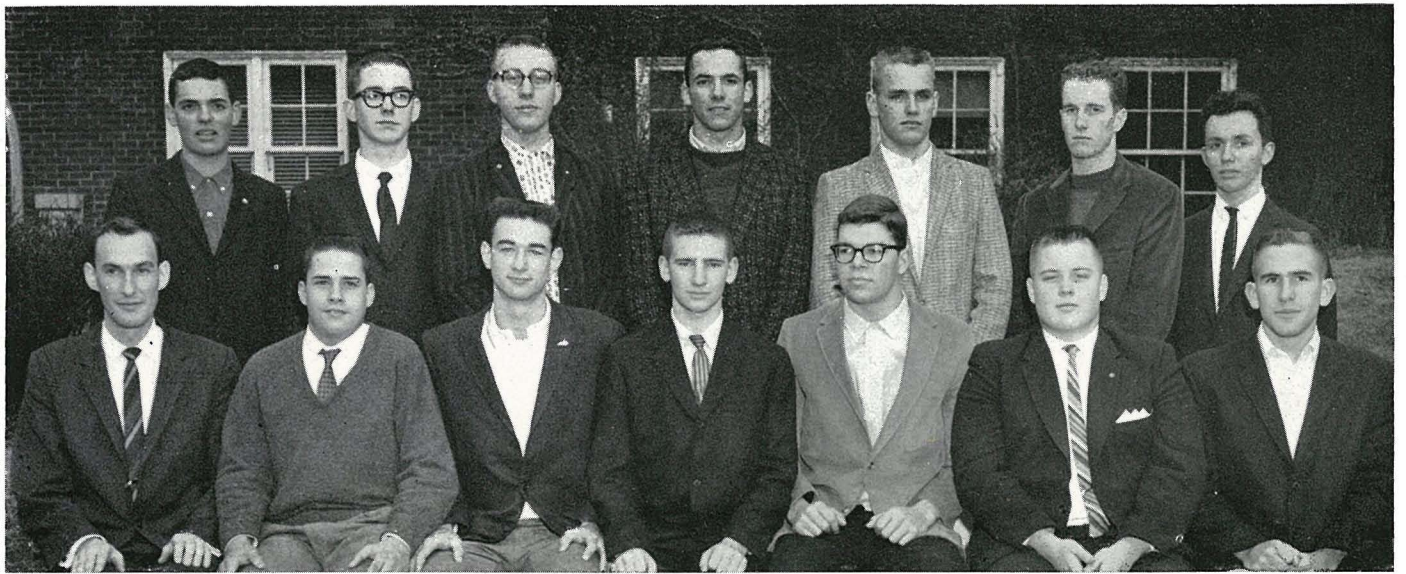

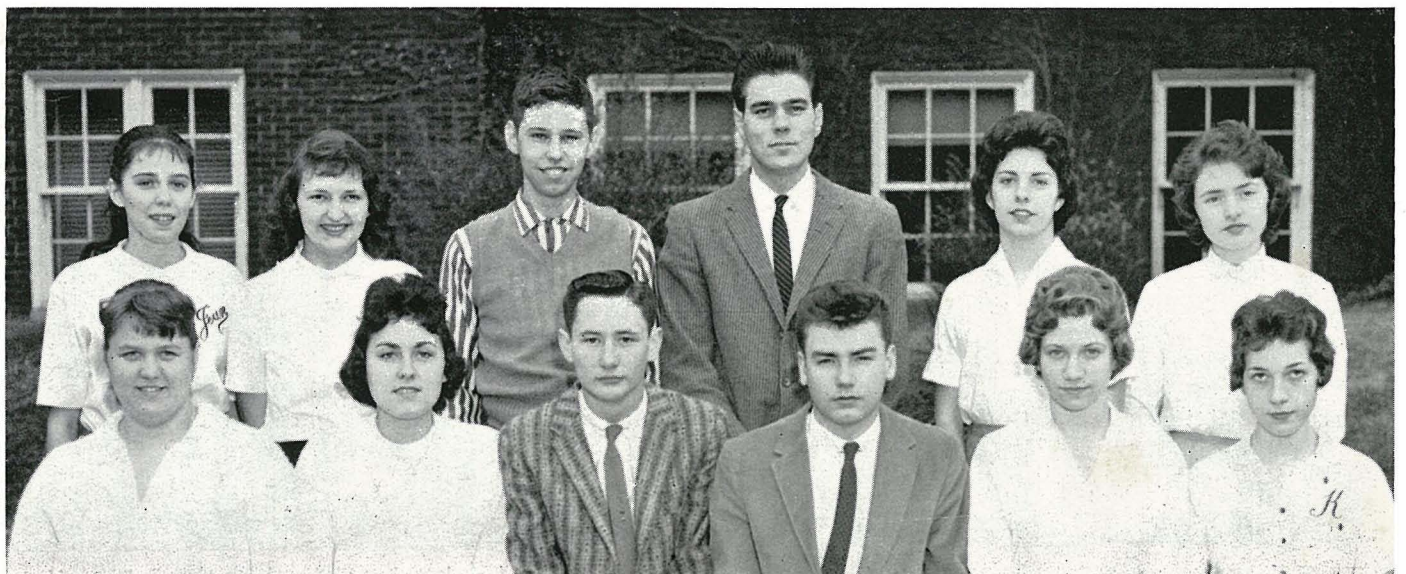

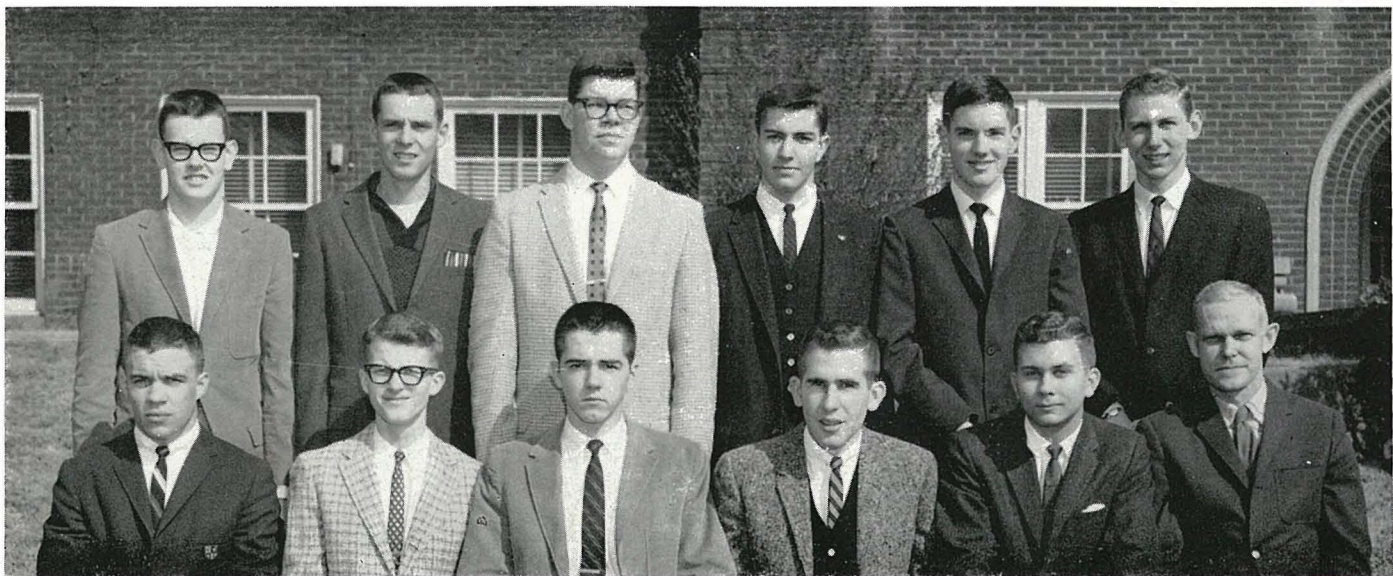

Sigmat Club

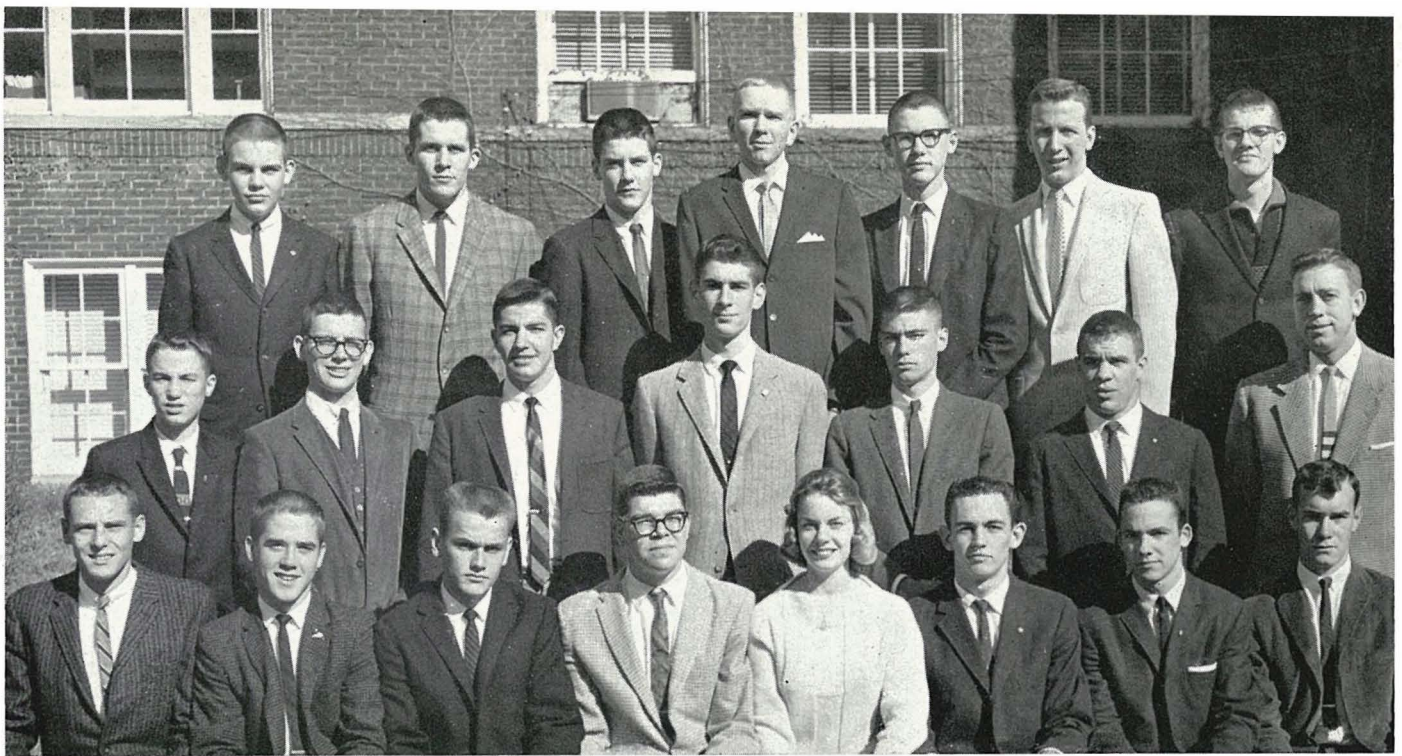

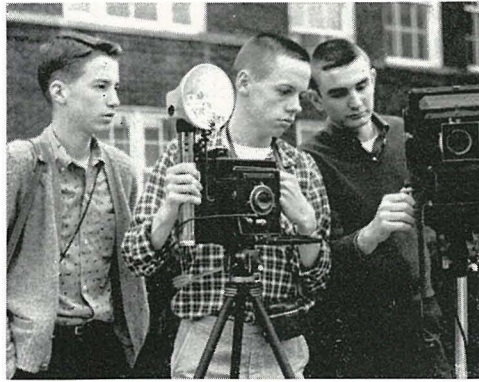

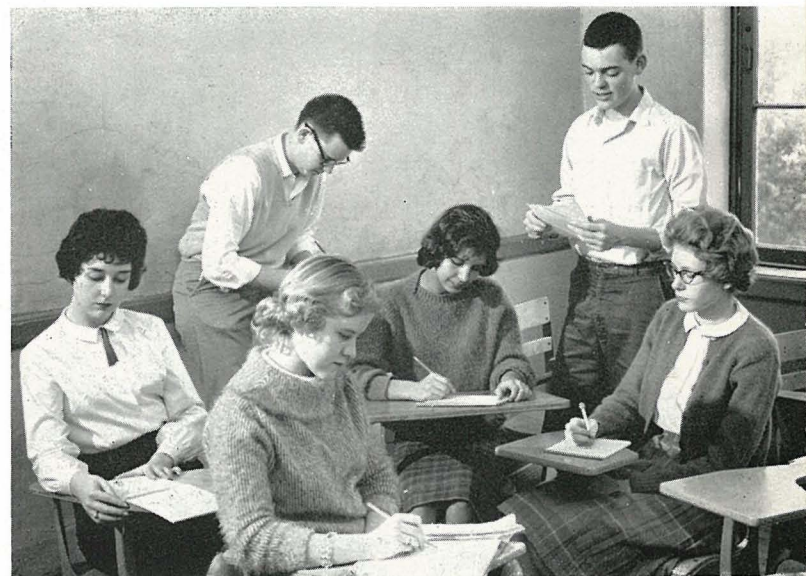
Collaboration among staff makes top-notch annual

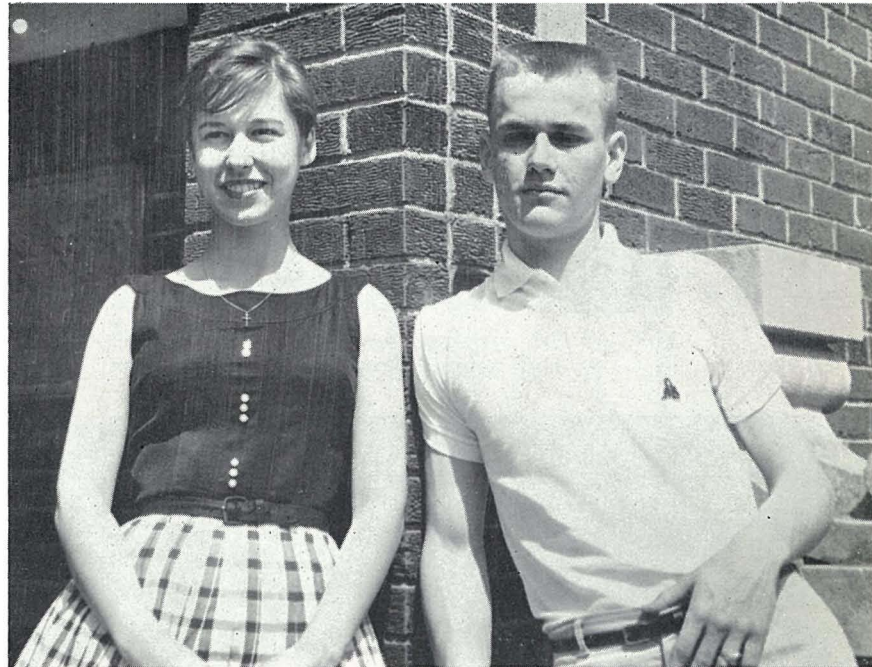

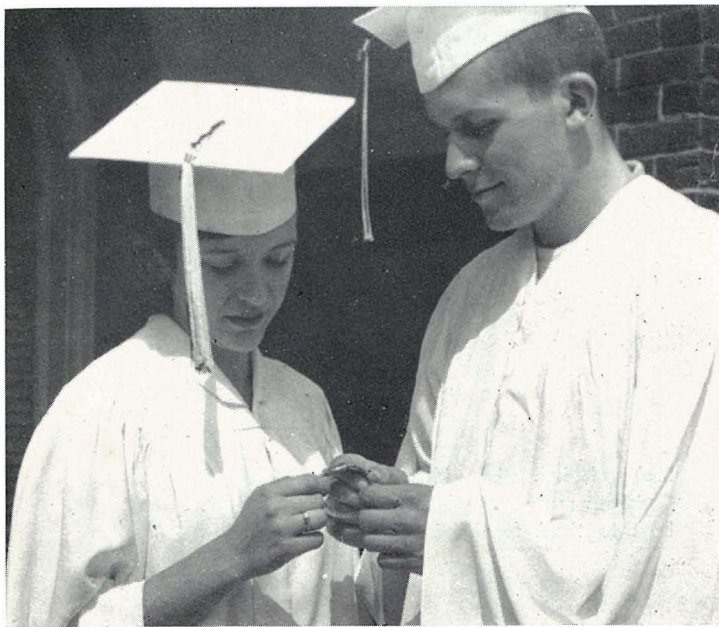

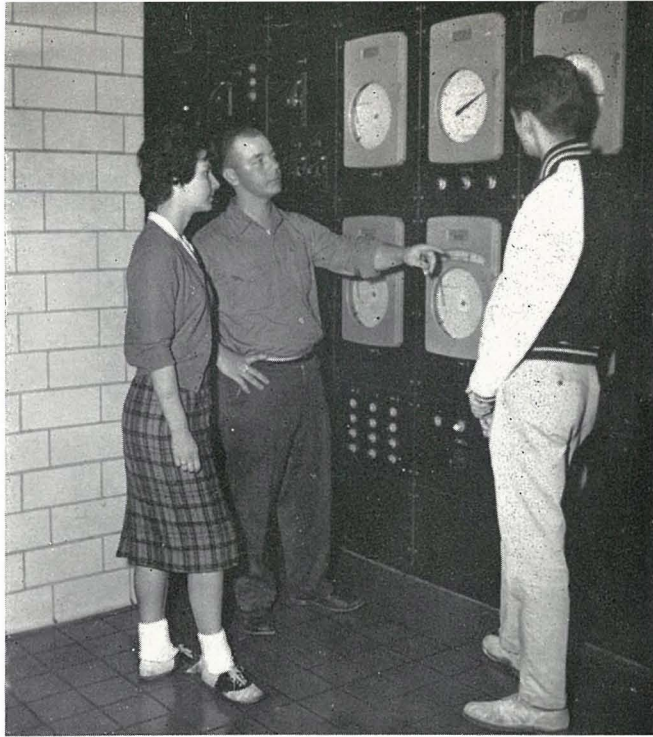

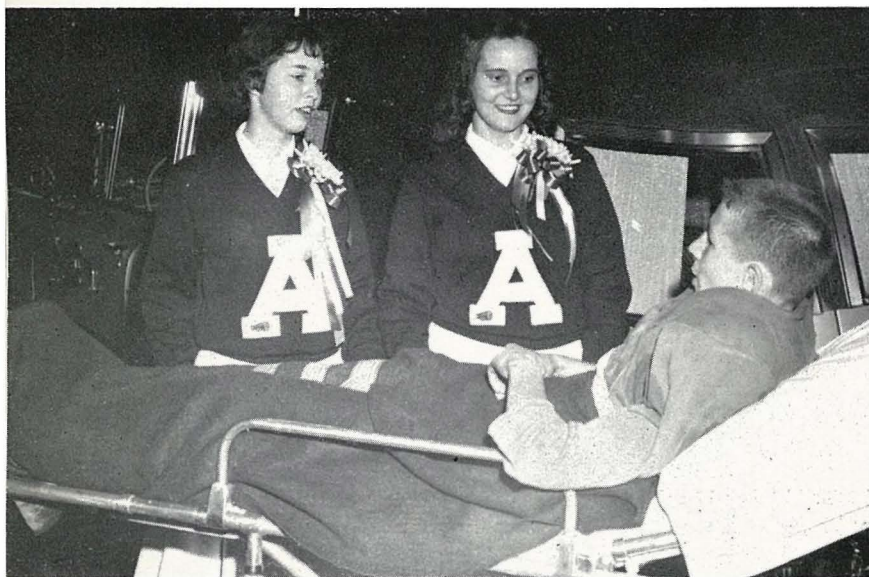

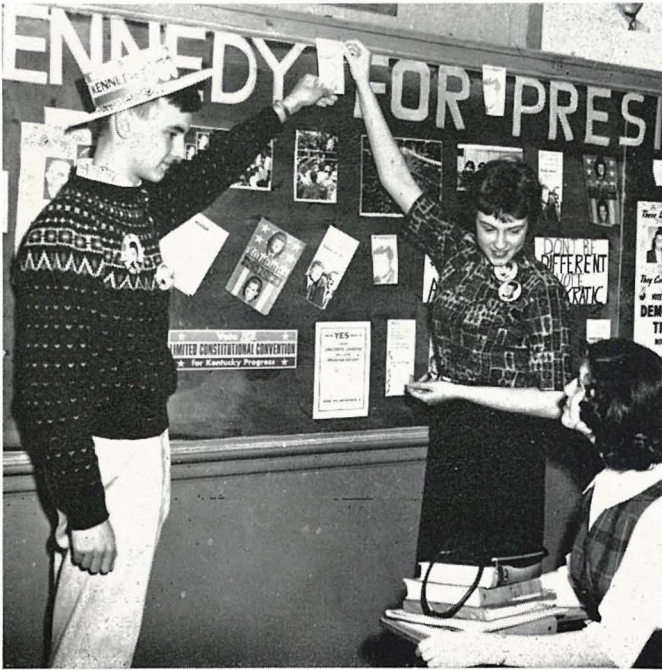

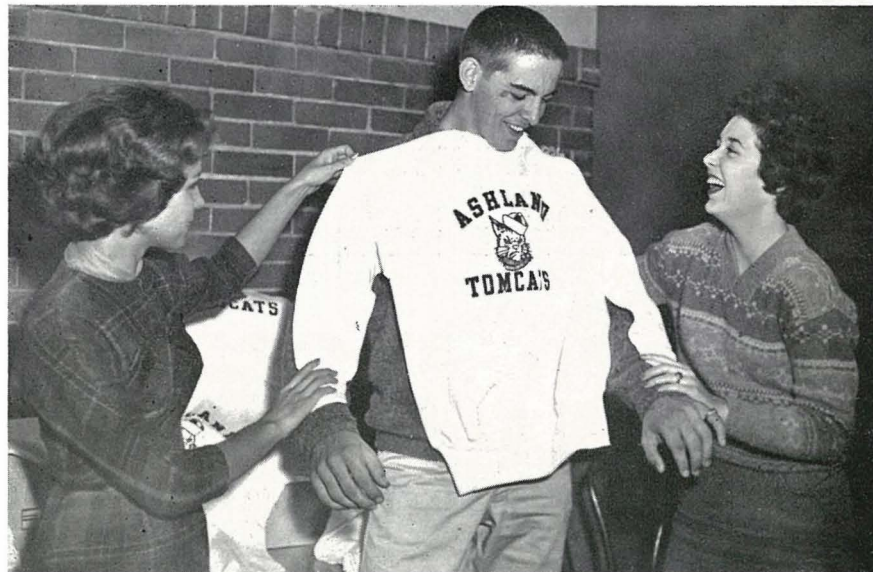

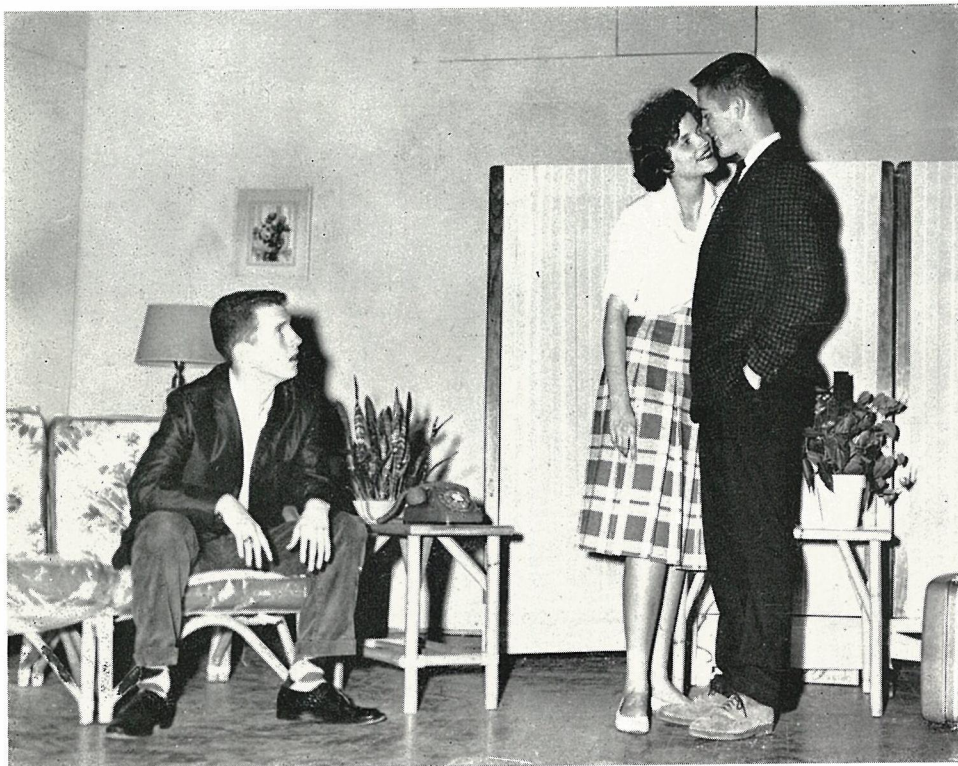

If they could in 1861, "We Can" in 1961

This year the R.O.T.C. Cadet Corps of Ashland High School, begun in 1936 under Major Edward Ficket, celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary. Ashland boasts of having one of the three units in Kentucky, Sgt. Stewart Houser, assistant to Major Ficket, organized the first A.H.S. rifle team, which placed second in the national William Randolph Hearst matches. In addition to receiving annually the Red Star award for proficiency in drill and tactics, the local corps has distinguished itself for its relief work in the 1937 flood and for originating a Christmas toy drive which has benefited thousands of children. A crowning achievement this year was the organization of a crack drill team known as the Ashland Rifles.

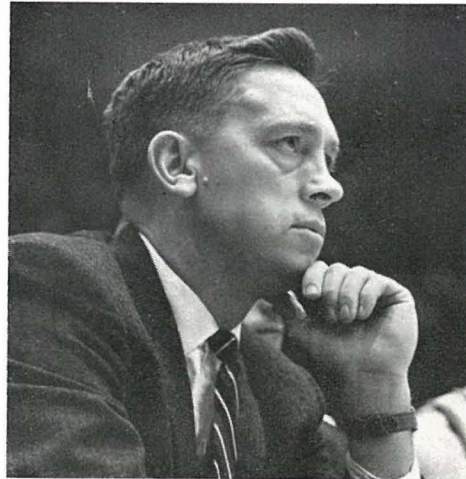
'Cats hit the jackpot

In winning the state basketball championship, Ashland Tomcats added the final touch of glory to their ever increasing prestige. The sensational game against Lexington Dunbar was the climax of the season. In the first half Dunbar put up a terrific battle, and the lead alternated frequently. Early in the third quarter the Tomcats showed their greatness and pulled away. The final score was Ashland's Kentucky State Champion Tomcats 60-59. The sweet taste of victory reminded the Tomcats of the hard work that had been previously necessary to make them a champion team. They had traveled to Georgia and dealt Atlanta Sylvan, the state champions of Georgia, their only loss of the year. The 'Cats also beat Atlanta Smyrna, the second best basketball team in Georgia. Upon returning home, the Tomcats entered the Ashland Invitational Tournament, where they easily overcame Greenup and Wheelwright. The A. I. T. championship game was tabbed as the top game of the regular season. Ashland, then ranked second in Kentucky, was matched against top-ranked Louisville Seneca. It didn't take long for the Tomcats to indicate that they disliked being second-rated. With an awesome display of great basketball they stomped Seneca's Redskins 79-50. In early March the Tomcats captured the 64th District championship and breezed into the finals in the 16th Regional, where they encountered the Clark County Cardinals. Clark County fell 90-73, and a berth to the state tournament belonged to the Tomcats.

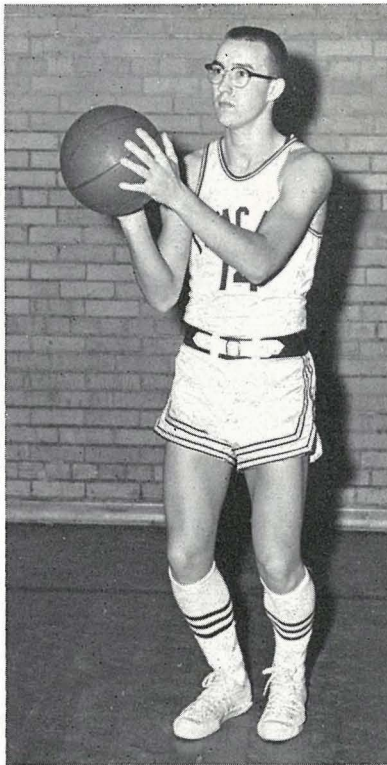

THE SOLID SEVEN

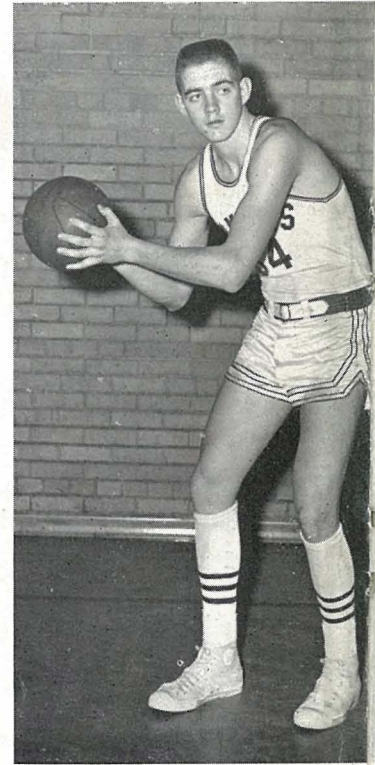

No terms but unconditional surrender

Ashland Tomcats opened their basketball season with a 41-point victory over arch-rival Ironton. After Catlettsburg, Elkhorn City, and Olive Hill fell easy victims, the Tomcats marched into Atlanta to duel Georgia's two undefeated teams, Atlanta Sylvan, the defending state champion, and Atlanta Smyrna, 1961 runner-up to Sylvan. Neither team was able to stop Ashland's fastbreak and to penetrate their close-knit defense. After their triumphant return from Atlanta, the Tomcats captured their A.I.T. championship from Louisville Seneca. This victory made Ashland the top-ranked team in Kentucky. Several games later the Tomcats received a staggering blow when forward Larry Conley sprained his ankle in a close 67-62 victory over Ironton. Playing the second game of a triple-header in Lexington's Memorial Colosseum, the Tomcats retained their number one rating with a 72-57 shellacking of Clark County. One week later, a 59-58 upset at the hands of hot-shooting Lexington Lafayette blemished Ashland's perfect 21-0 record. The loss woke up the 'Cats, however, and primed them for the game against the Portsmouth Trojans which they won by a 87-74 score. Ashland closed its spectacular regular season by defeating Breathitt County 79-61.

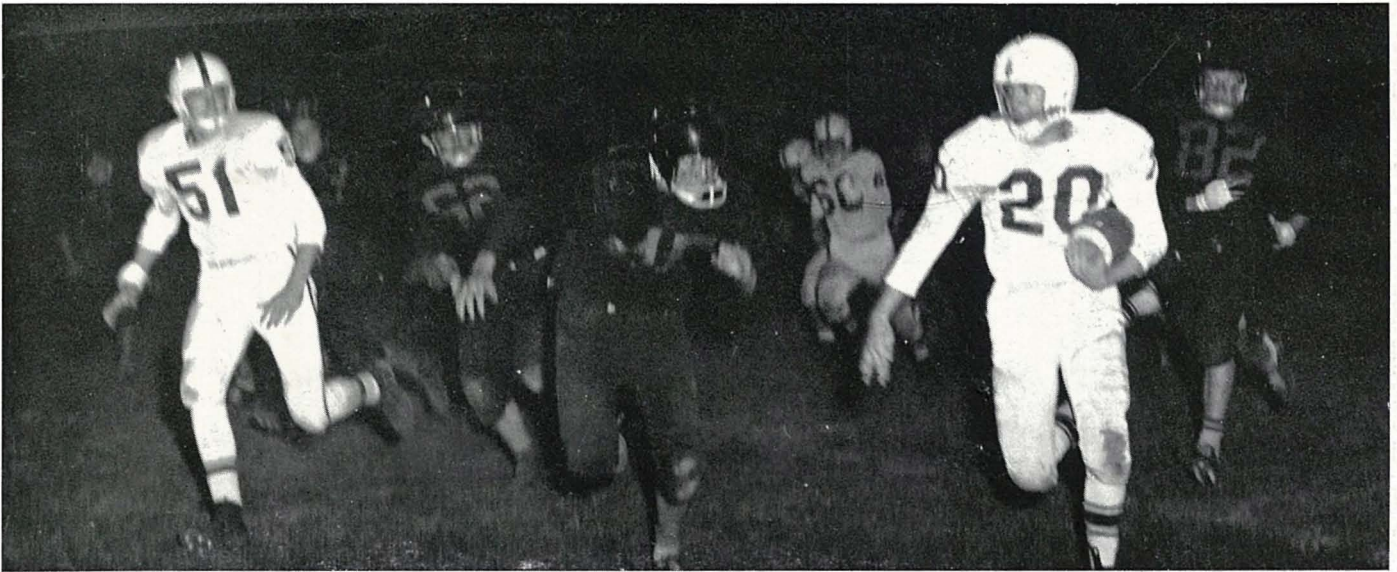

Athletes win grants

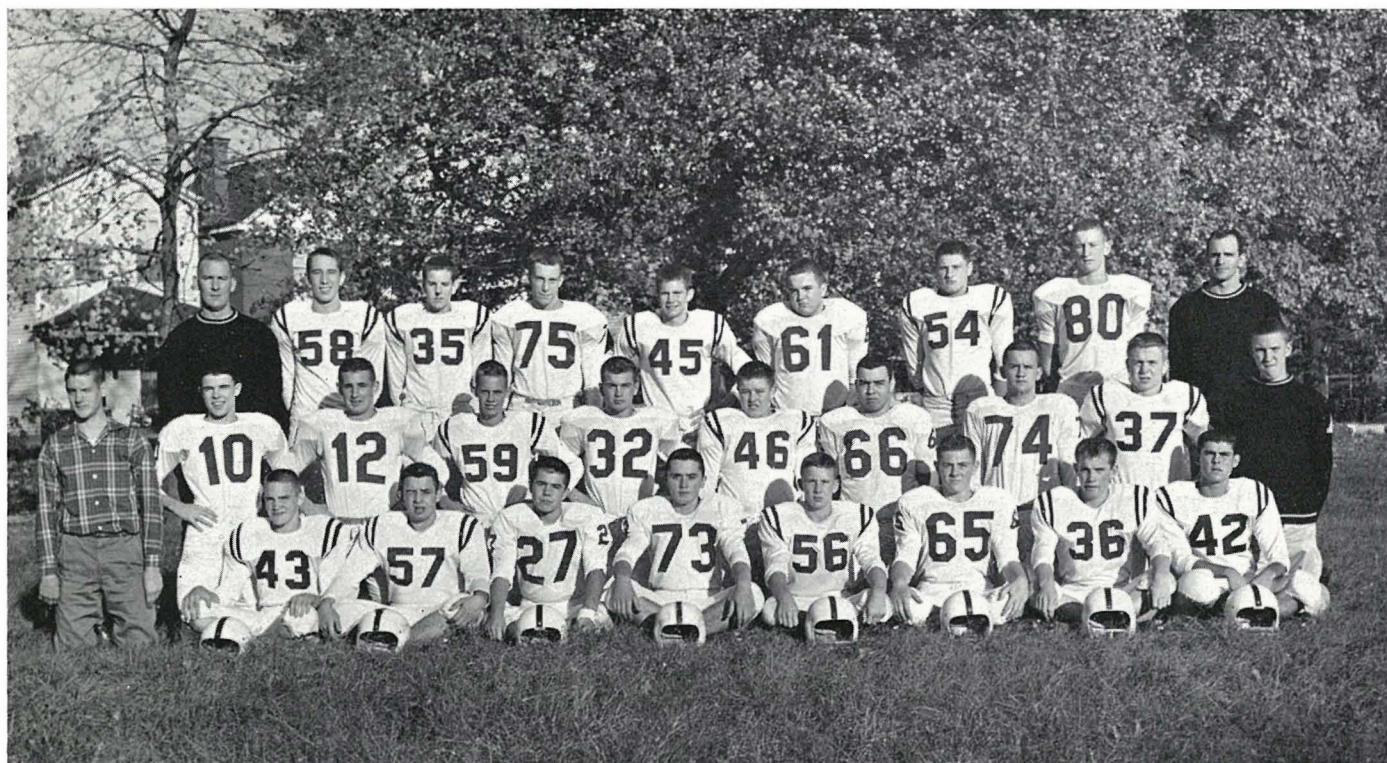

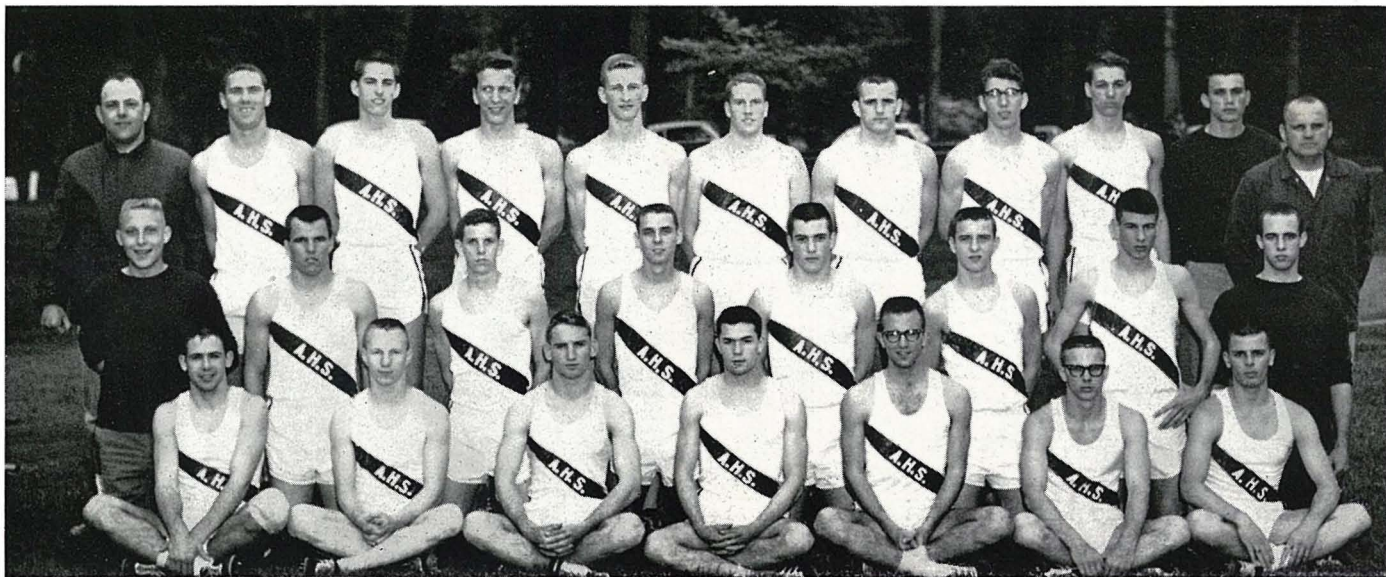

Thinclads shatter records

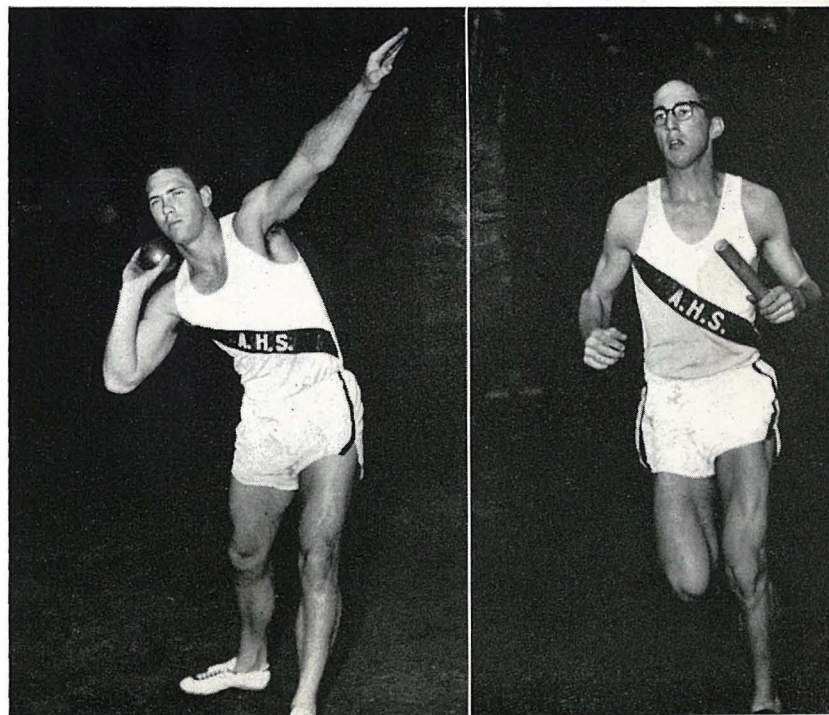
