Languages assume importance in new era

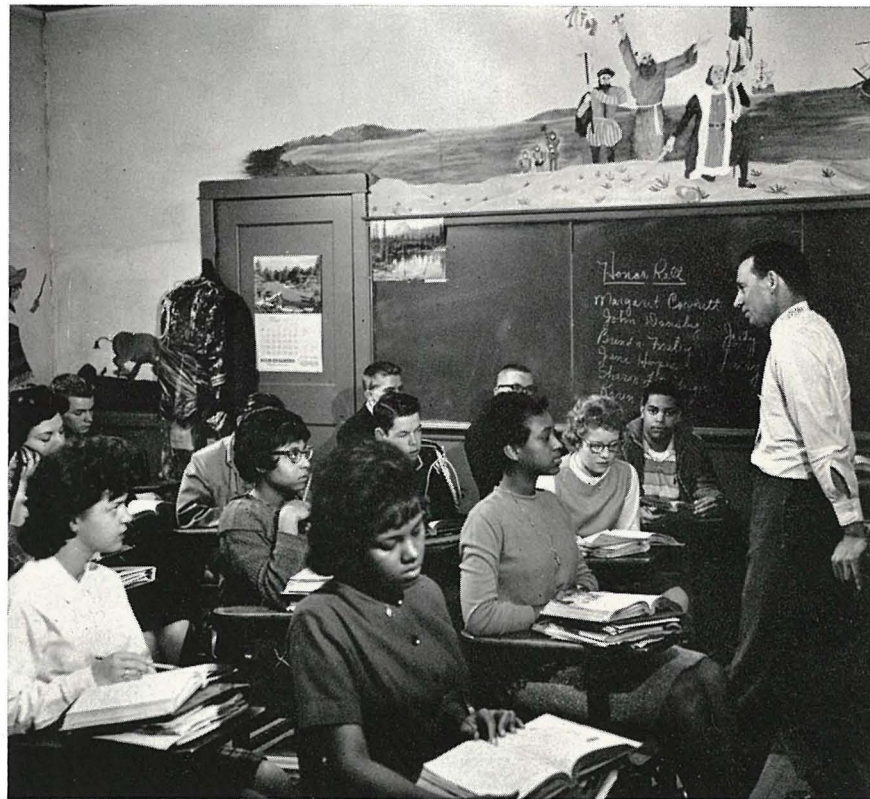
The expediency of a multi-lingual knowledge is evident in our shrinking world of trans-oceanic telephone, intercontinental television, international space exploration, and accessible world travel. This progress has prompted a plan for expanding the foreign language department of Ashland high into four-year courses in Latin, French, and Spanish. A language-listening laboratory and junior high school French and Spanish classes will operate next year. Modern-day Caesars will learn of ancient battle strategies as well as the origins of more than 50 percent of all English words when they study Latin. The study of French artists and novelists and of Spanish culture will highlight classes in these Romance languages.

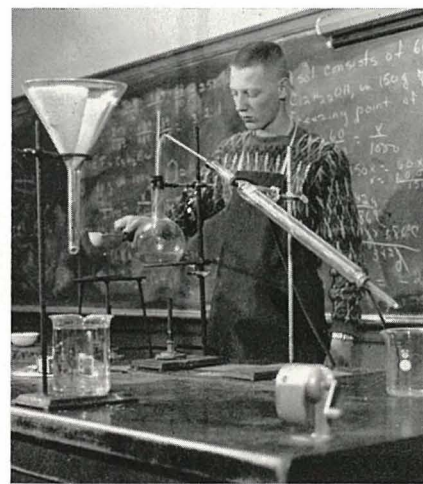


Science, math are "musts" in age of astronauts

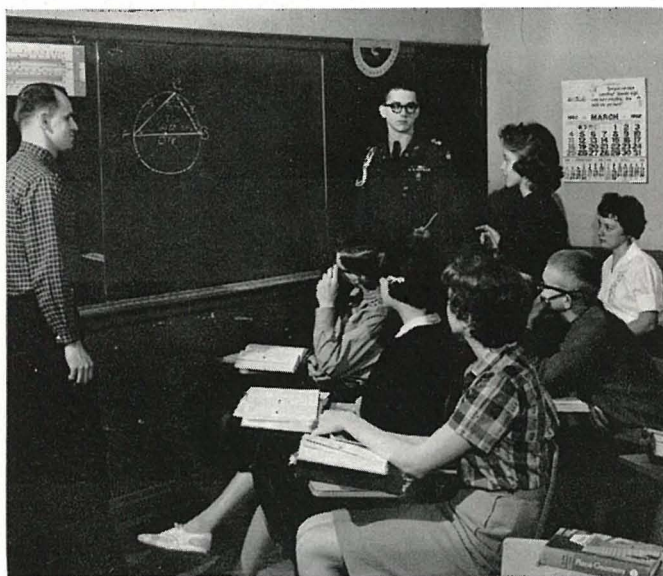

In order to prepare for this course, science teachers, Miss Wilma Mobley and Mr. Robert Dils, accepted National Science Foundation awards to attend institutes at outstanding universities. During the past year math has become increasingly important. 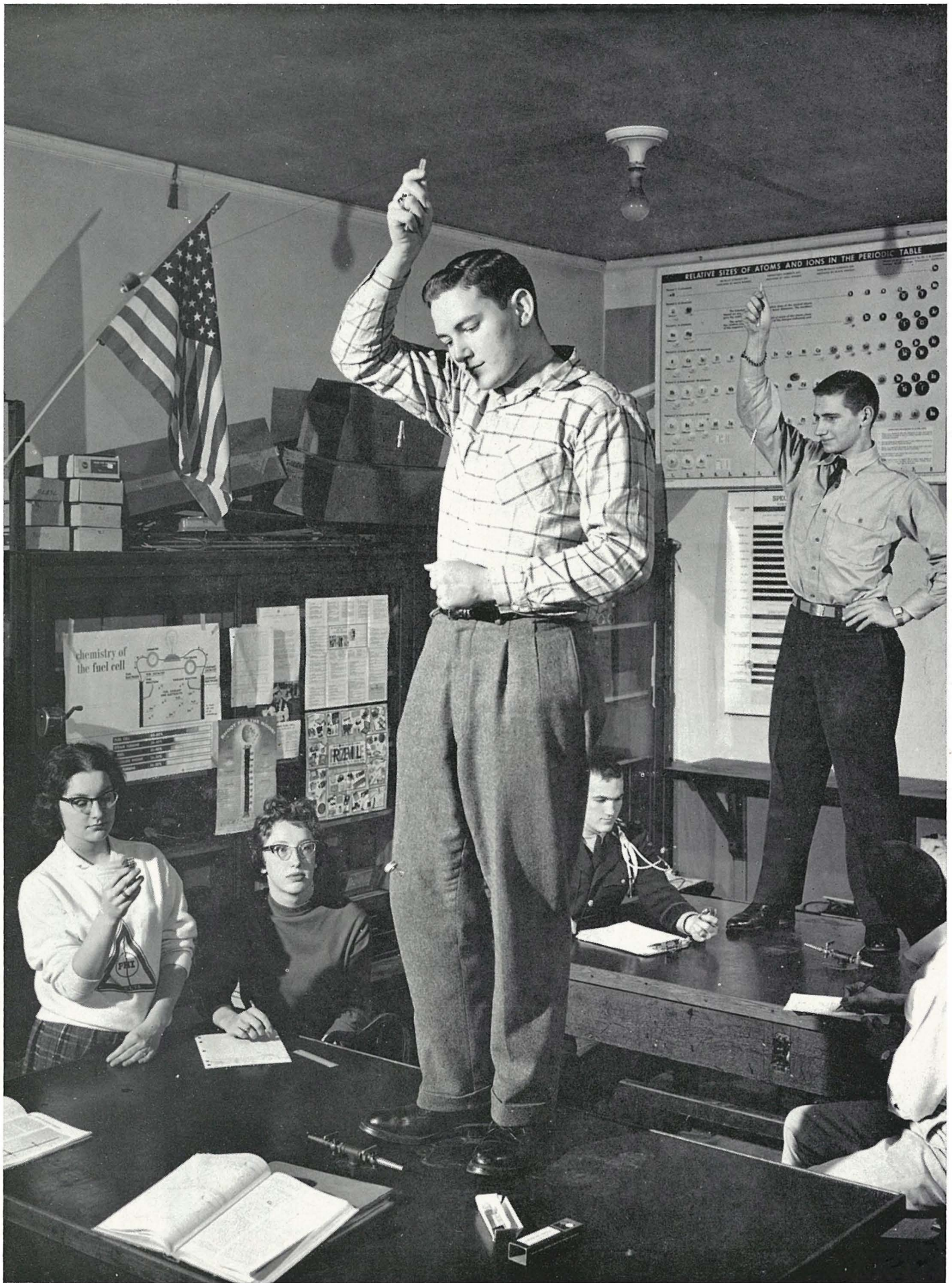

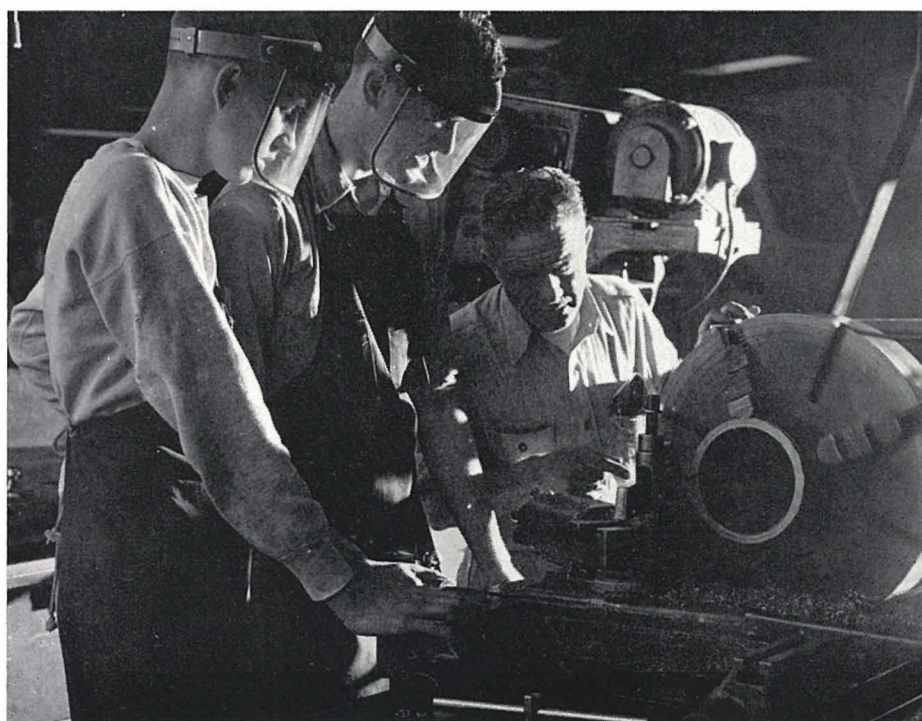


Hands in home, shop prepare for life of happiness

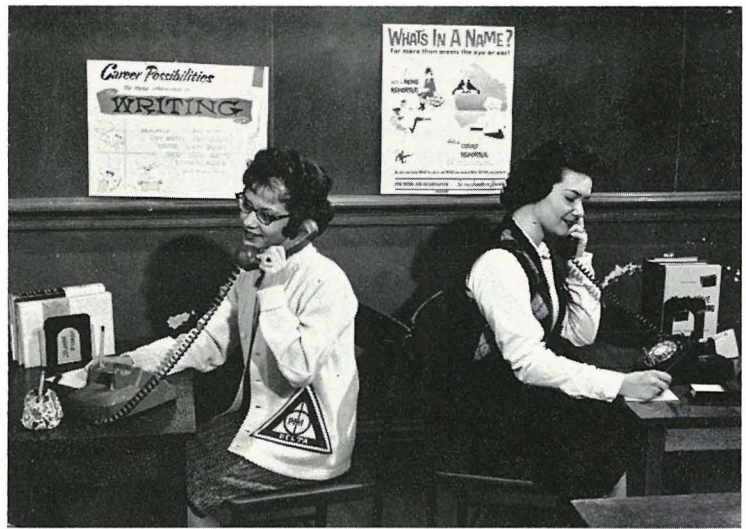
Tax reports tax brains of the best

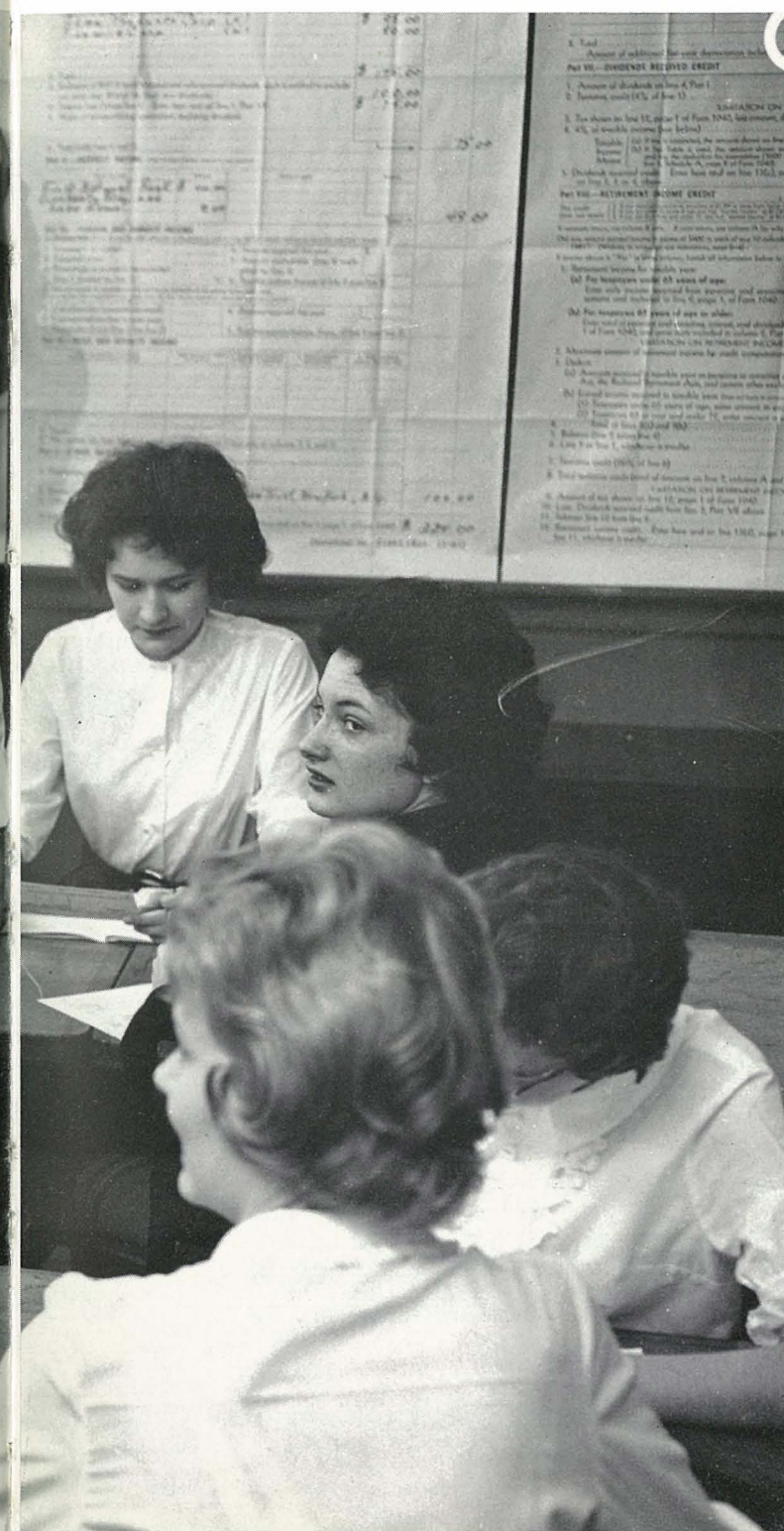

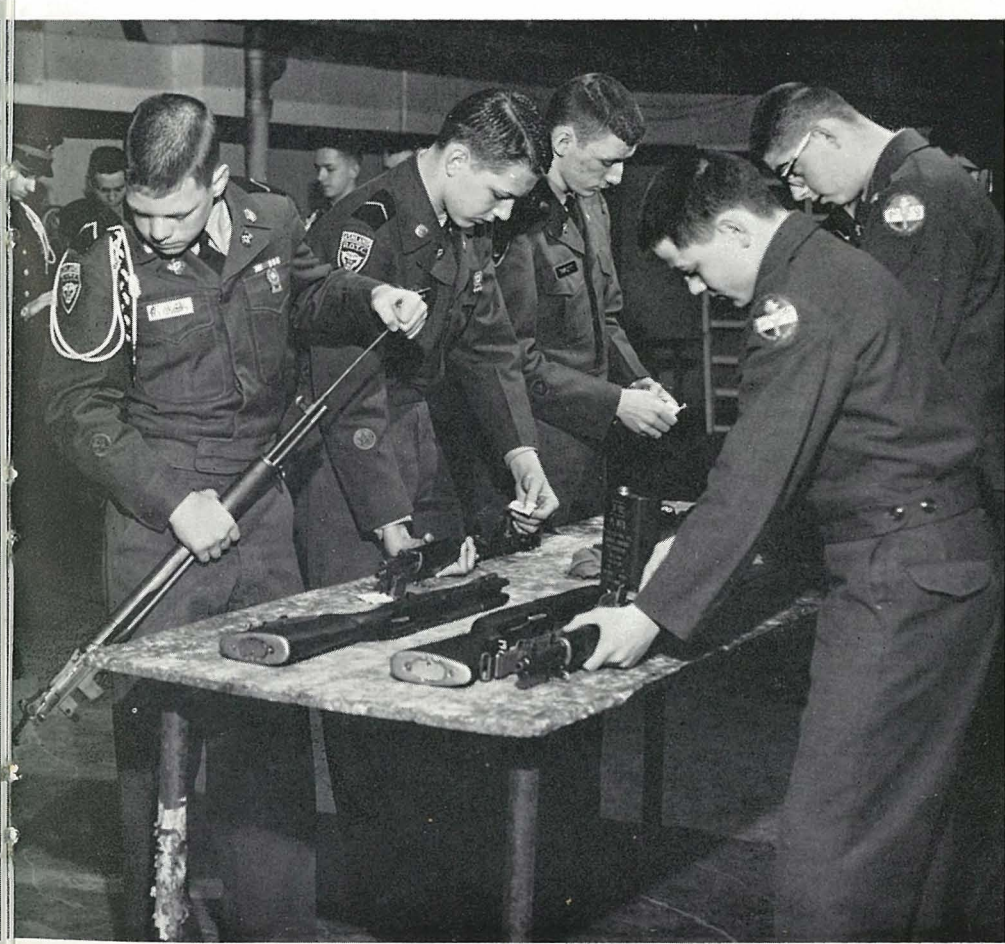
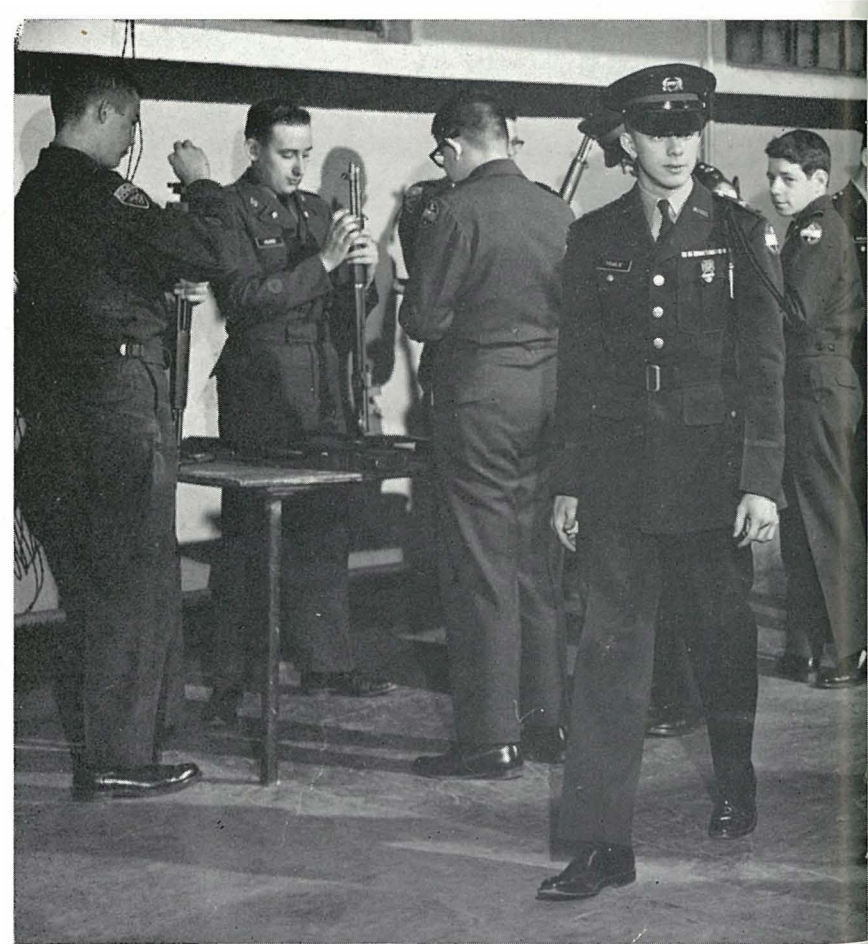
Cadet Major Lee Frailie, making a tour of inspection during rifle-cleaning period, keeps firm watch to see that each cadet cleans weapon correctly.

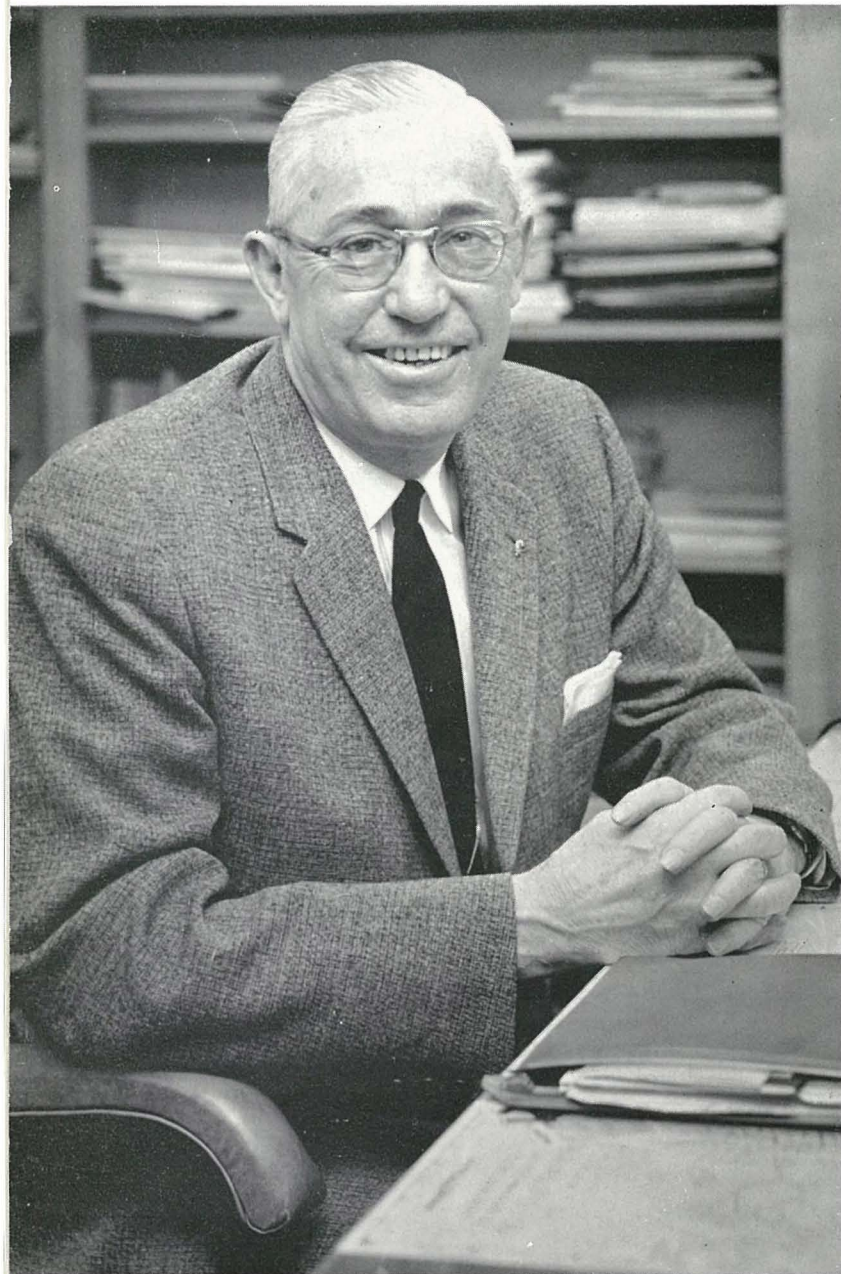

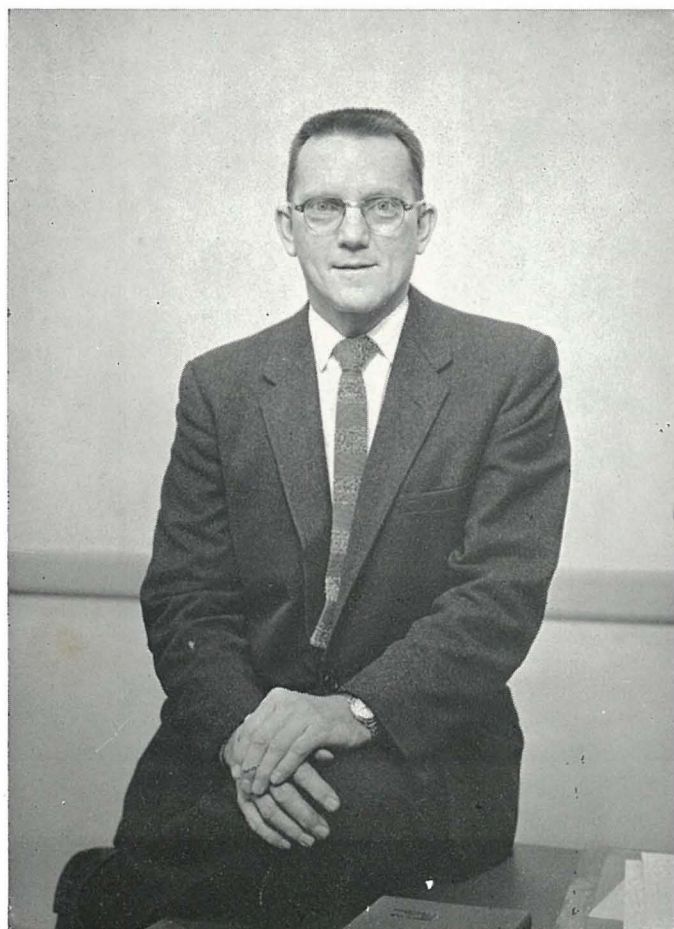
W. C. Shattles, leading educator, head of the Ashland schools.

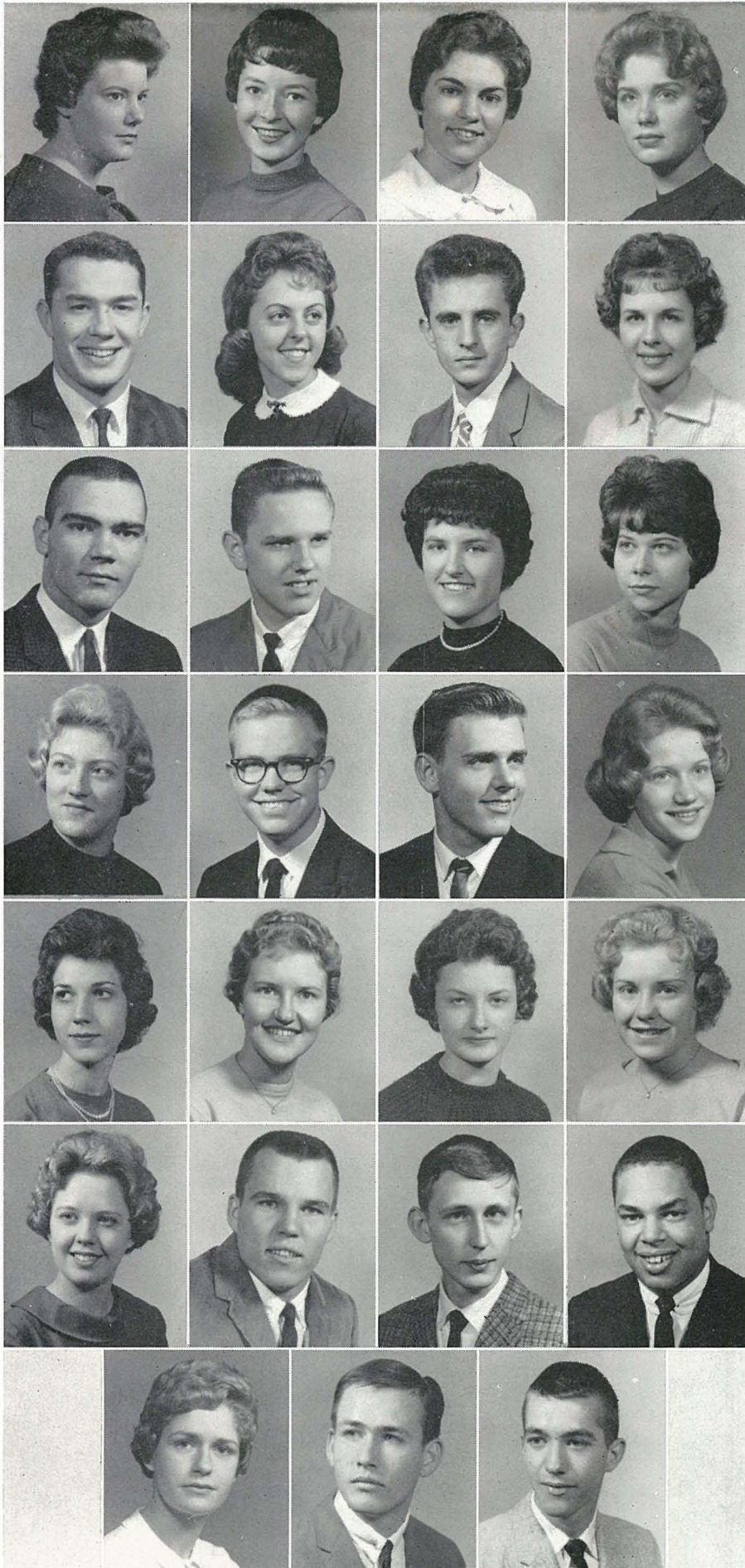

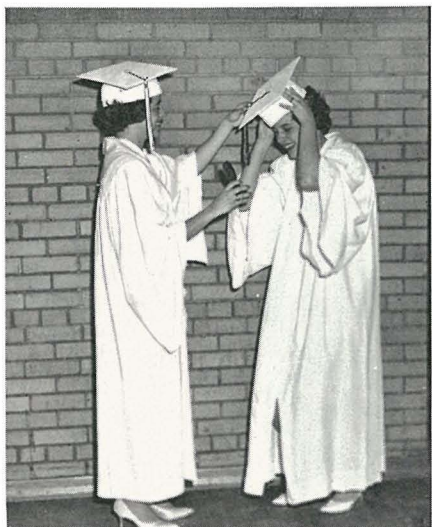

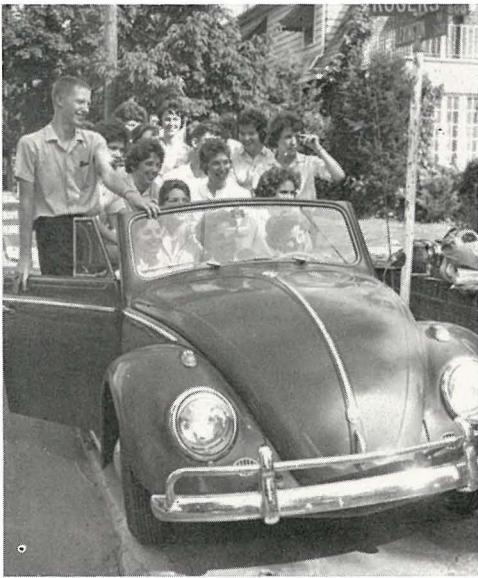

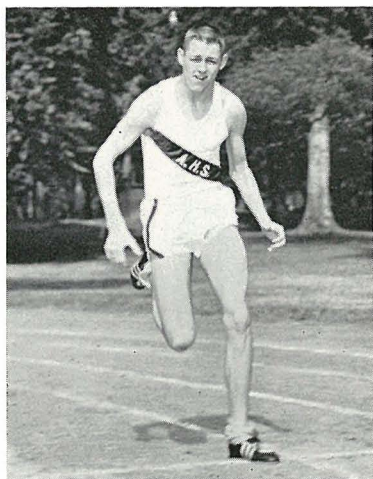

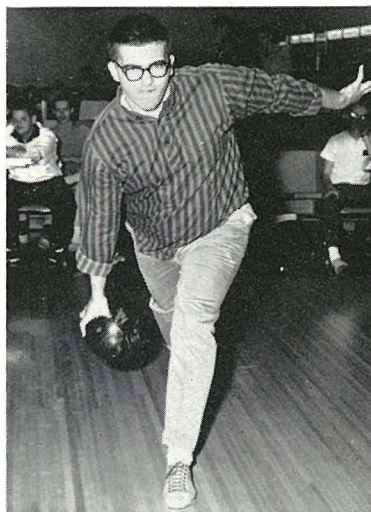
Sophs—silly and sassy

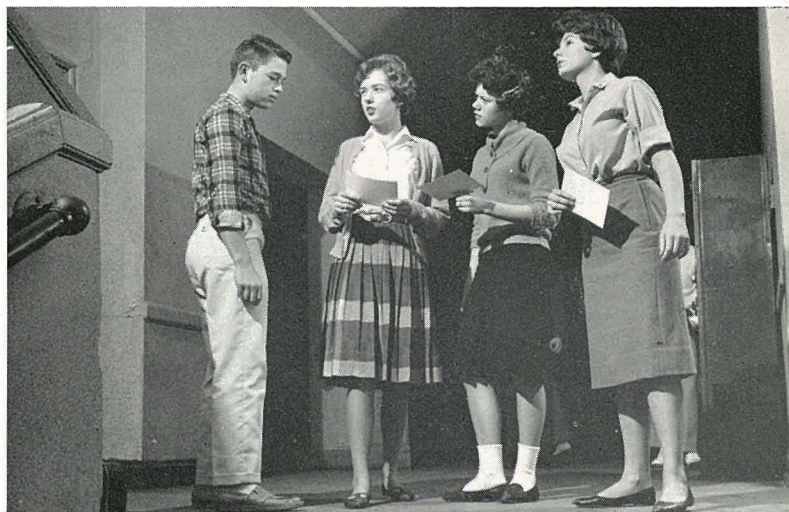

Technical Society

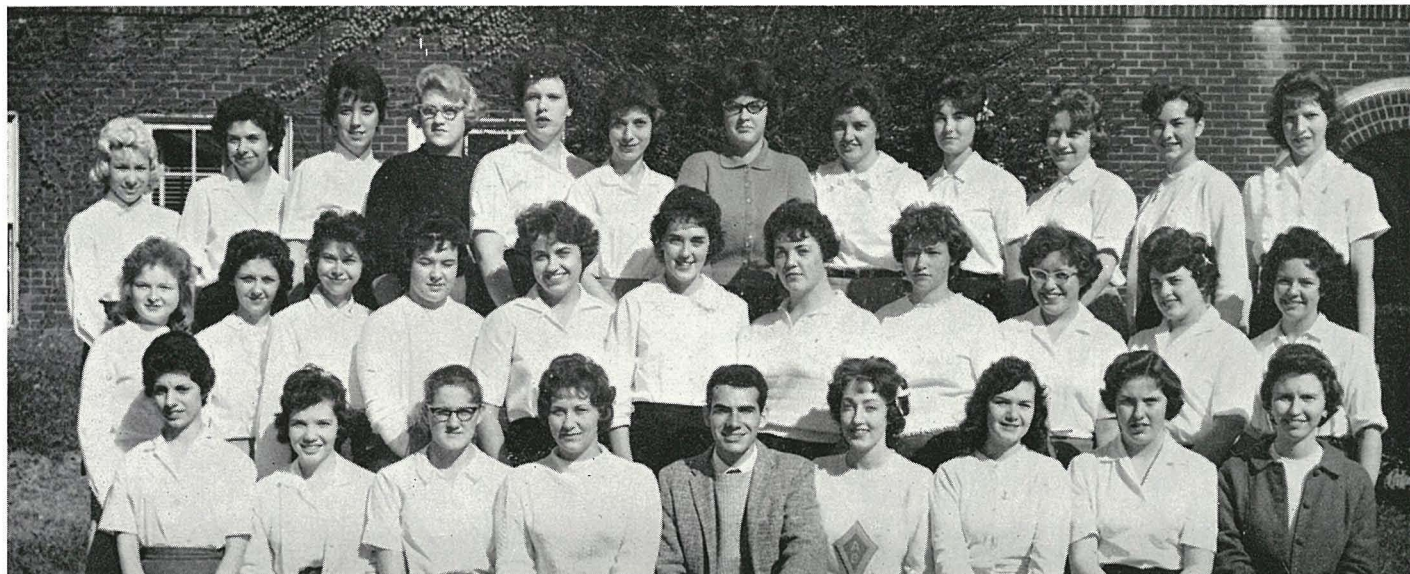

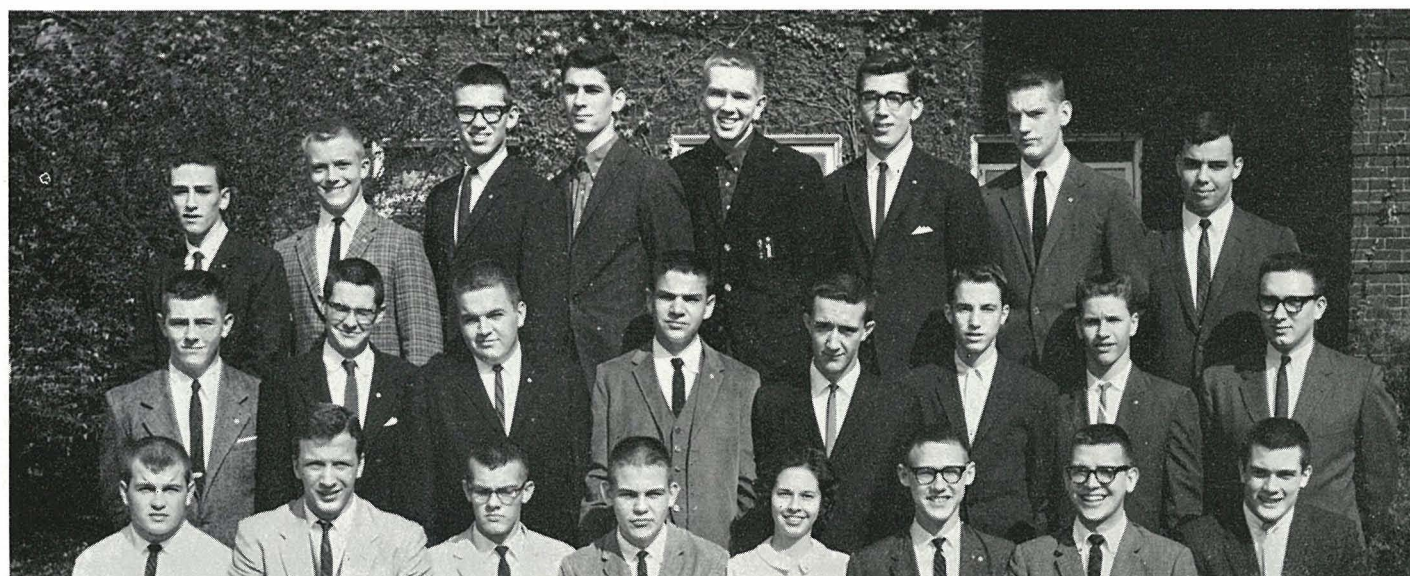

Alpha Beta Club

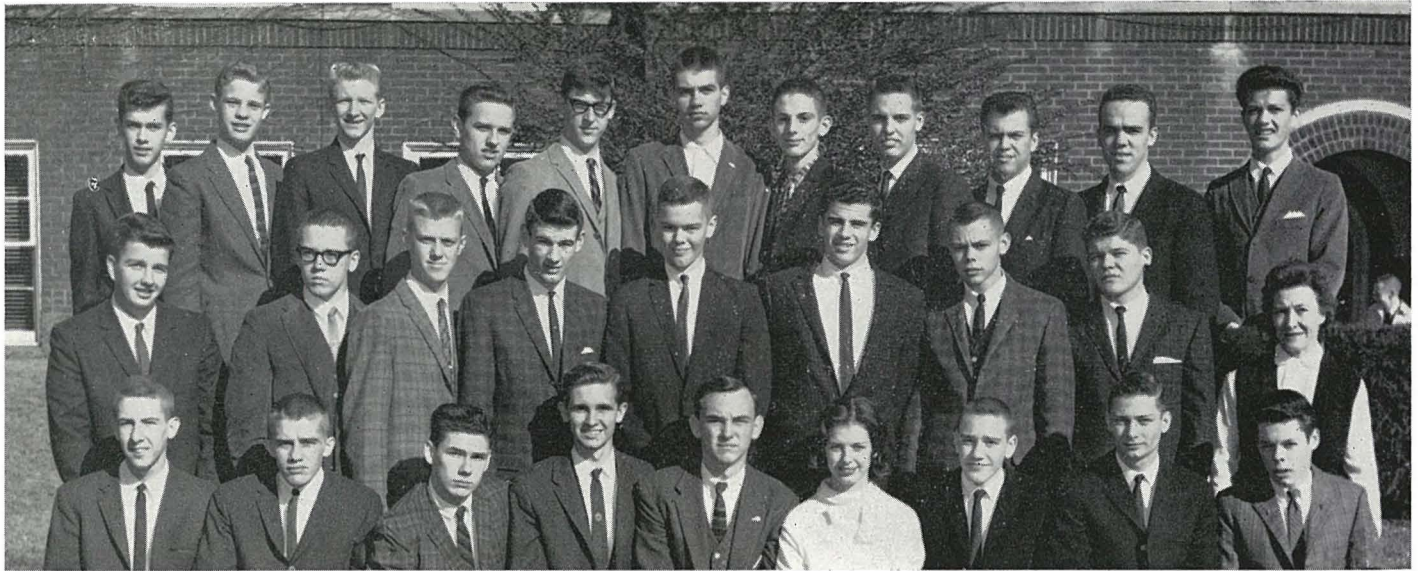

Chevron Club

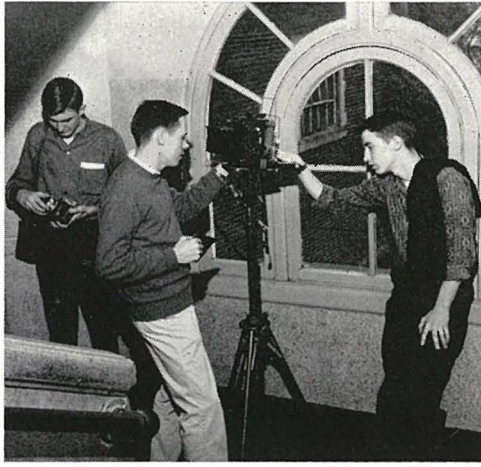

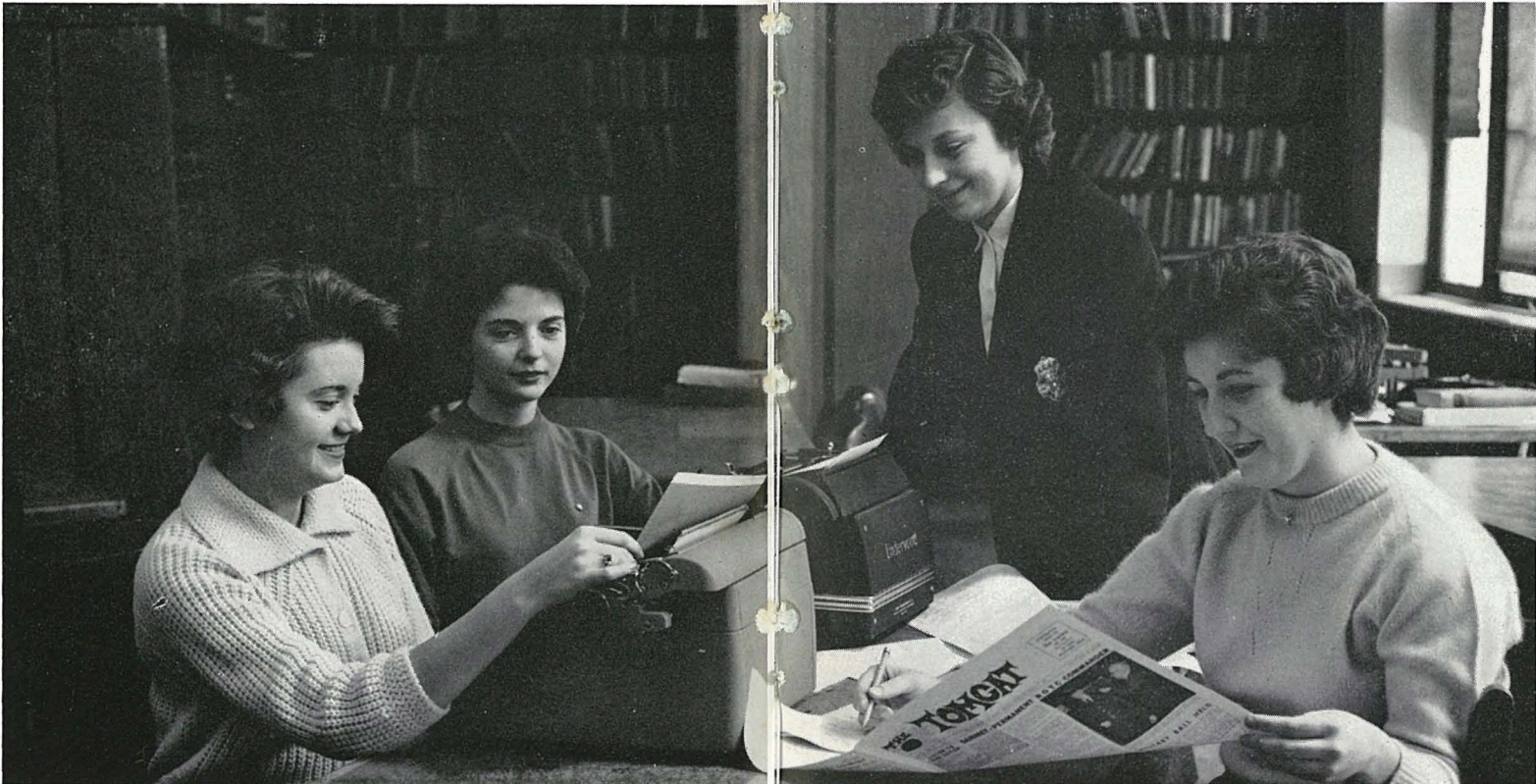

Top recognition orbited

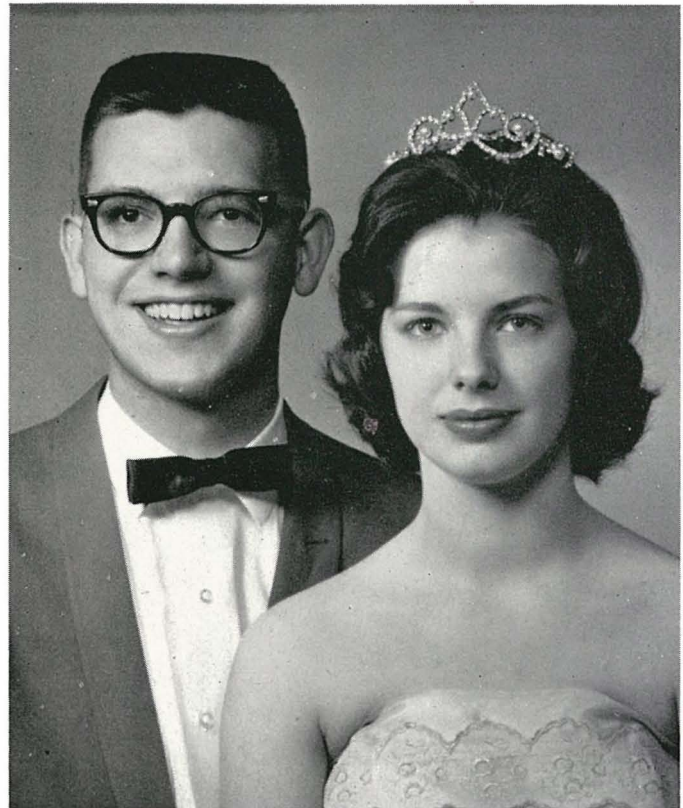
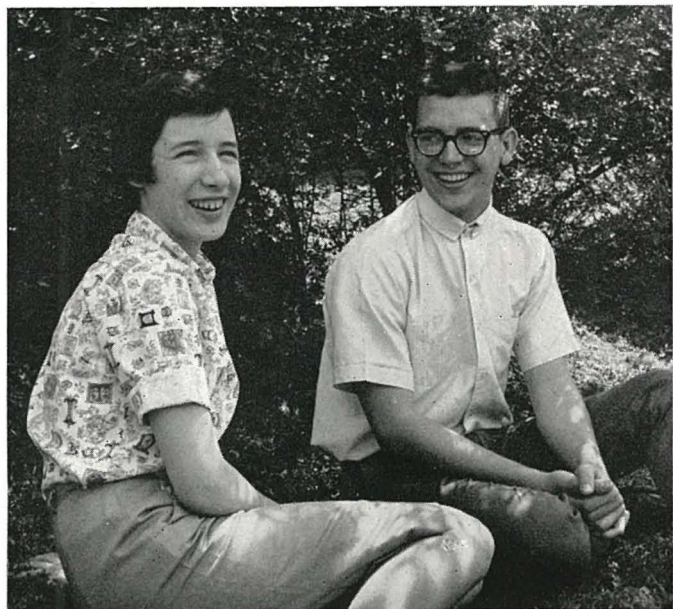

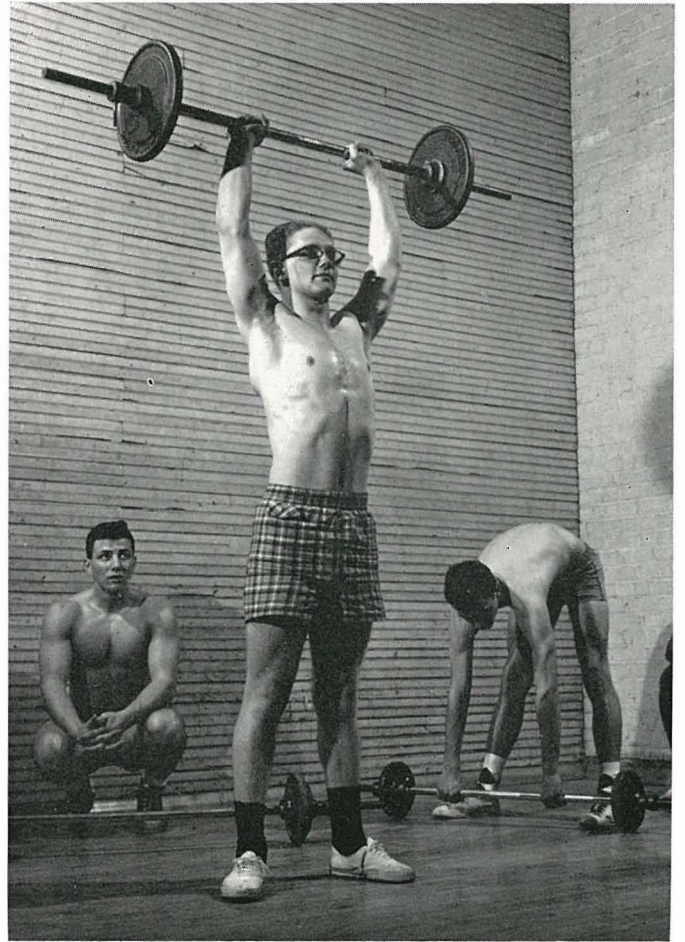

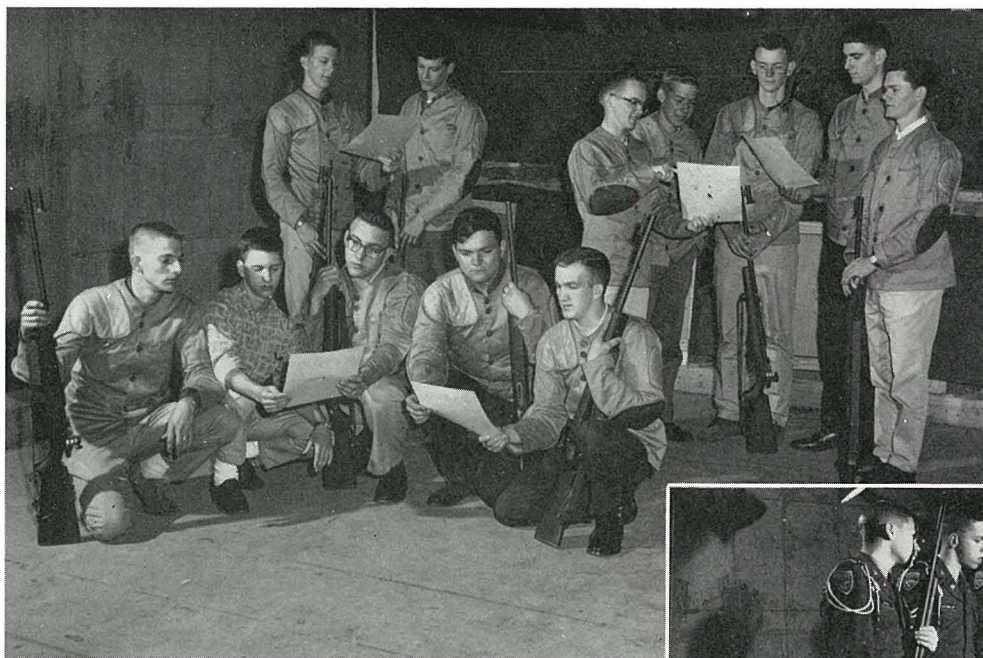

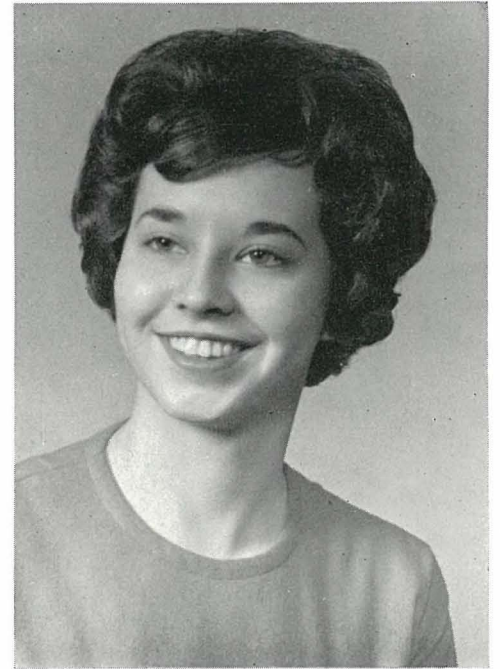

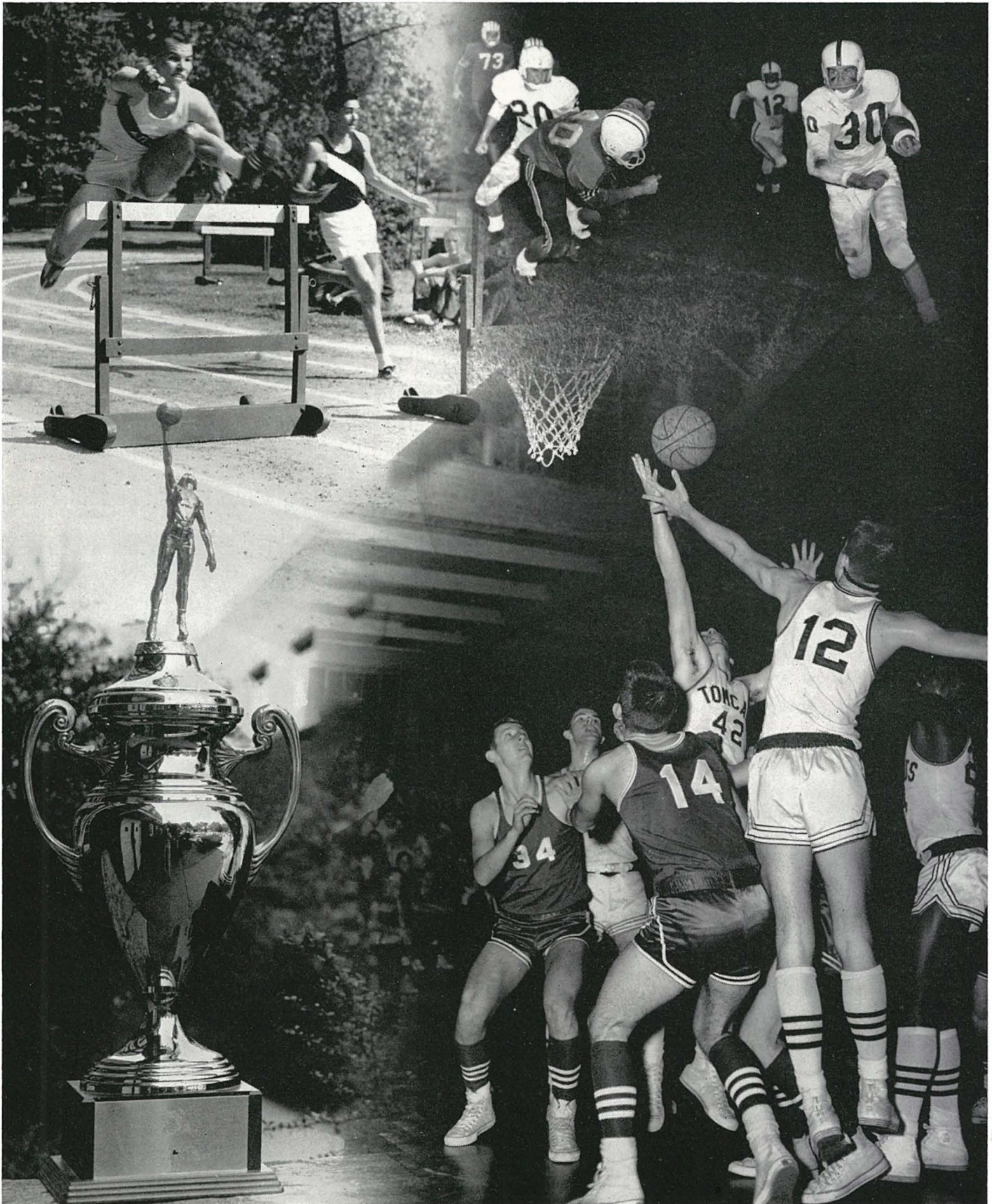

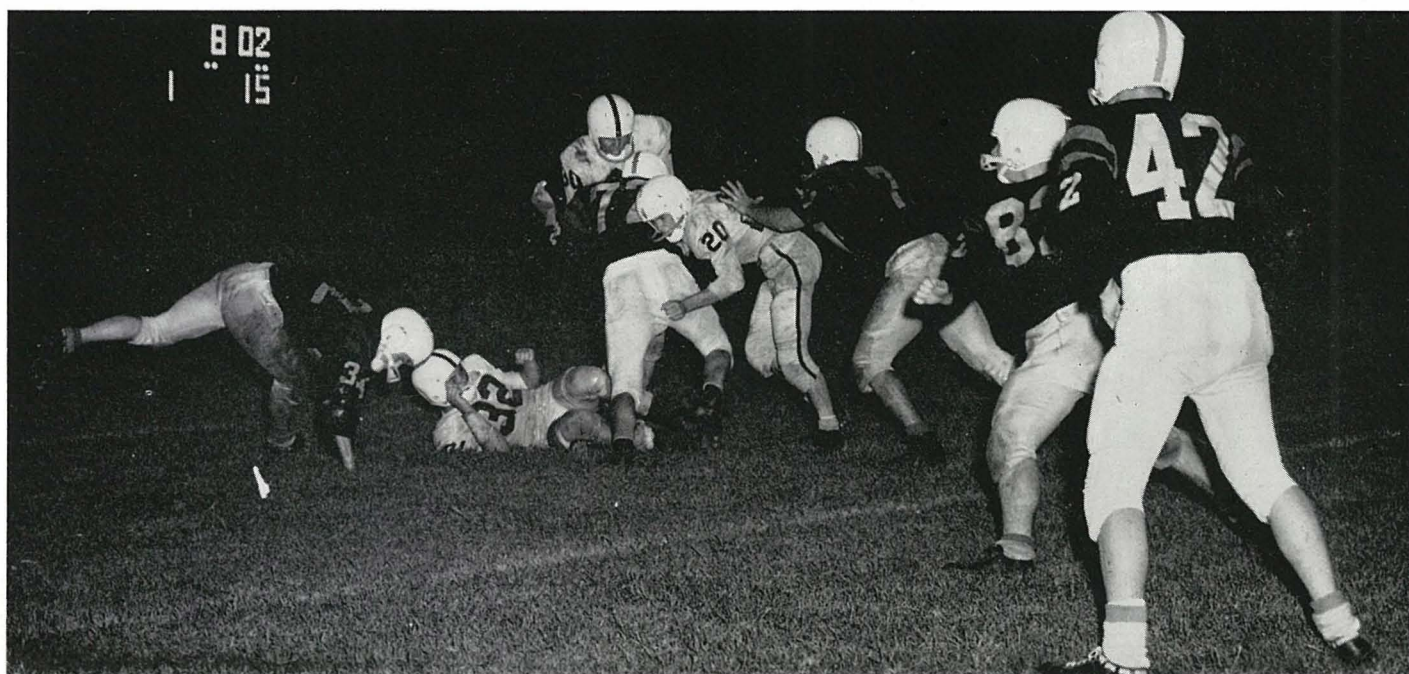

Tomcats earn grants, honors

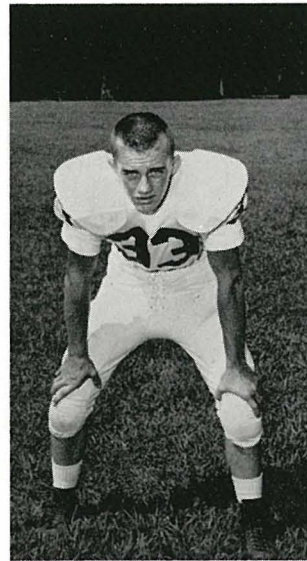

'Cats' efforts will pay off in '62



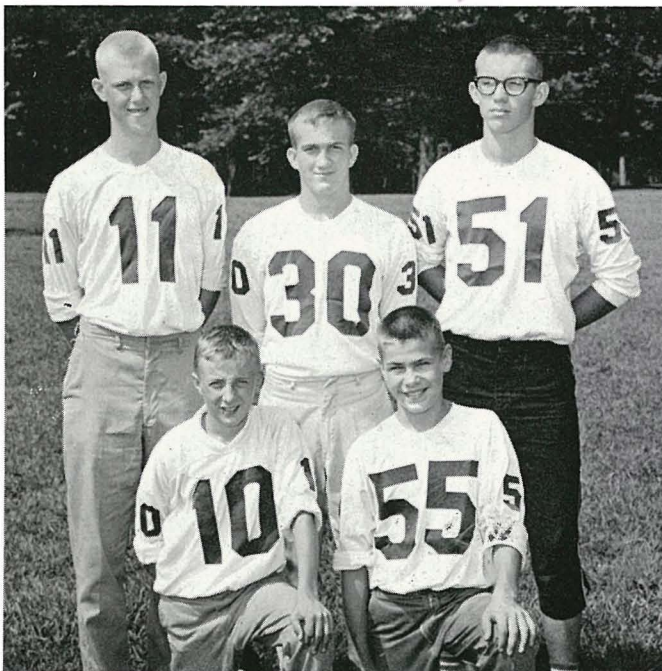

Coaches Miller, Conard, Boehm, Anson battled Lady Luck for 'Cats' four wins and six losses.

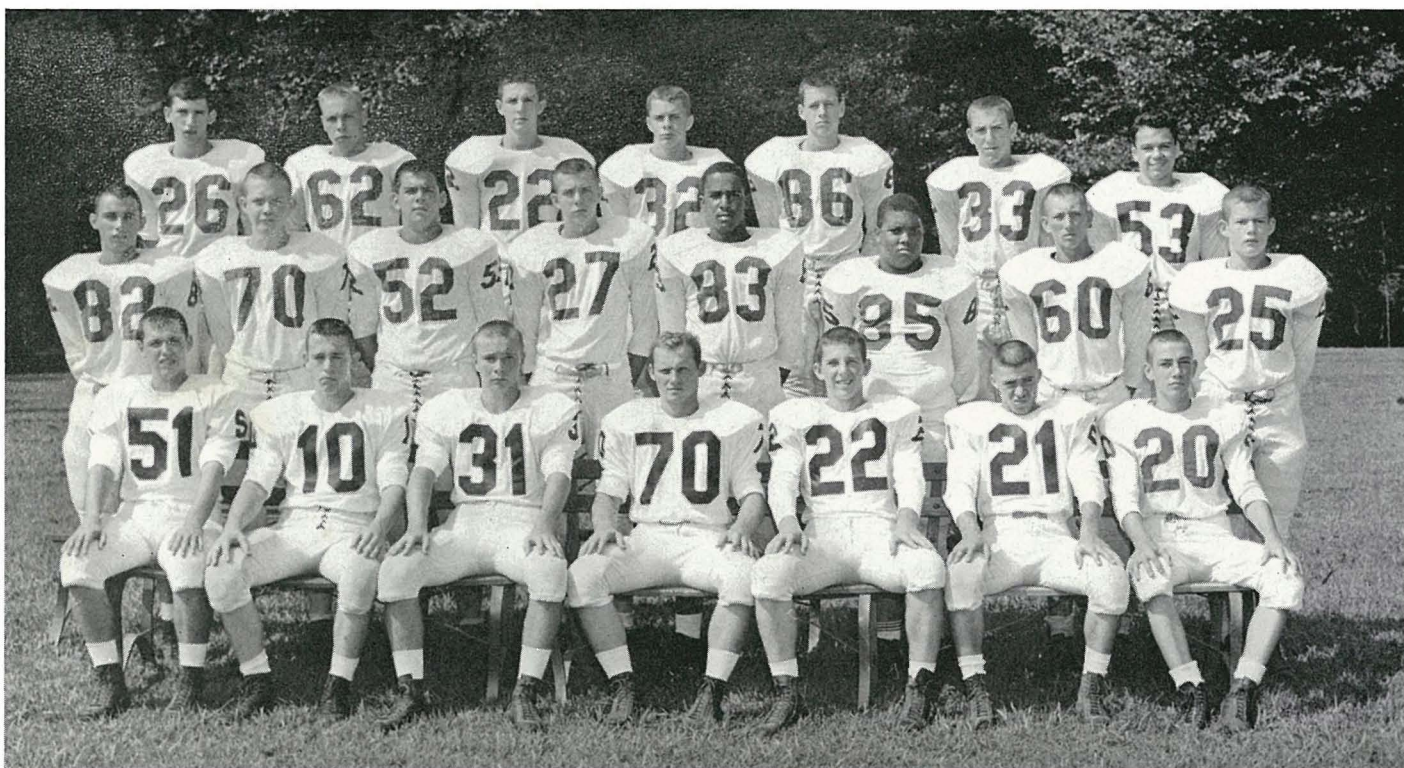
Kittens drop one game out of seven

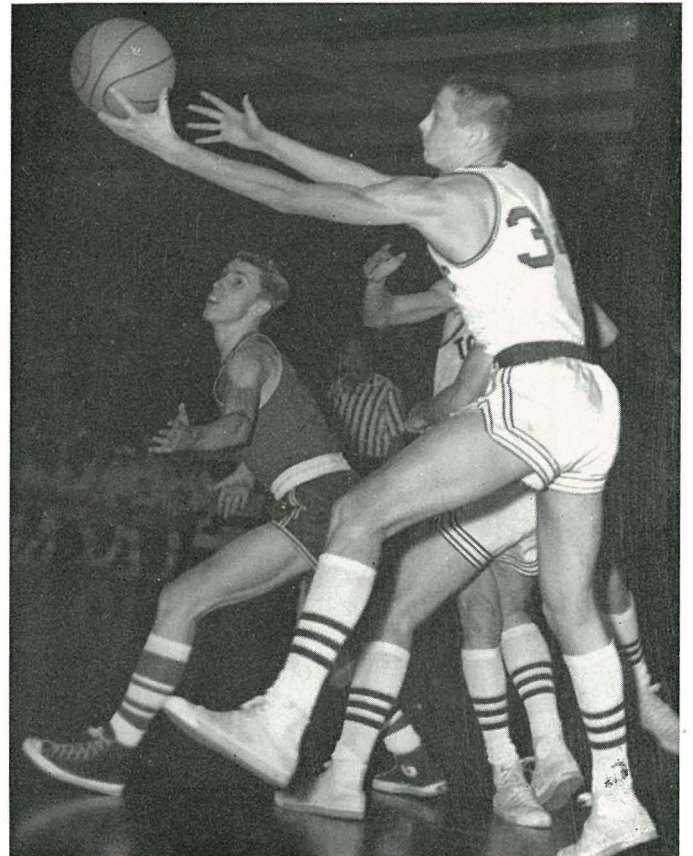


Bob Yancey (30) backs up Larry Fairchild as he outleaps his opponent for a driving lay-up before a yelling Tomcat cheering section.

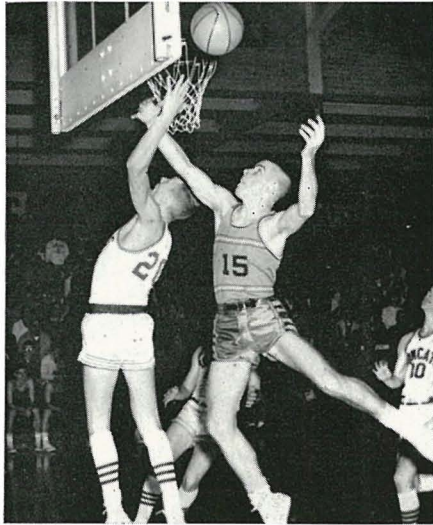
'Cats miss second state

With a brilliant display of teamwork and a fighting Tomcat spirit, Ashland's basketball quintet came within five points of winning its second straight state basketball championship. In a grueling contest the championship game was dropped to St. Xavier of Louisville by a 62-58 score. Larry Conley was selected for the All-State team and juniors Jim McKenzie and Ken Johnson received All-State Honorable Mention. Ashland continued its reputation of being a team, not a "one-man show." 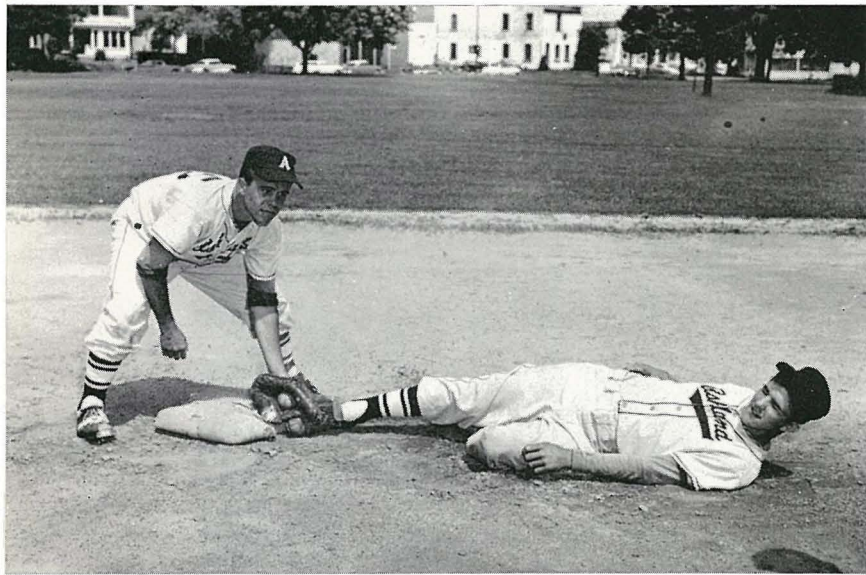
B-team was hot

All-American Larry Conley uses one of his many "Gib" moves as he scores on a rebound shot while surrounded by opposing team members.

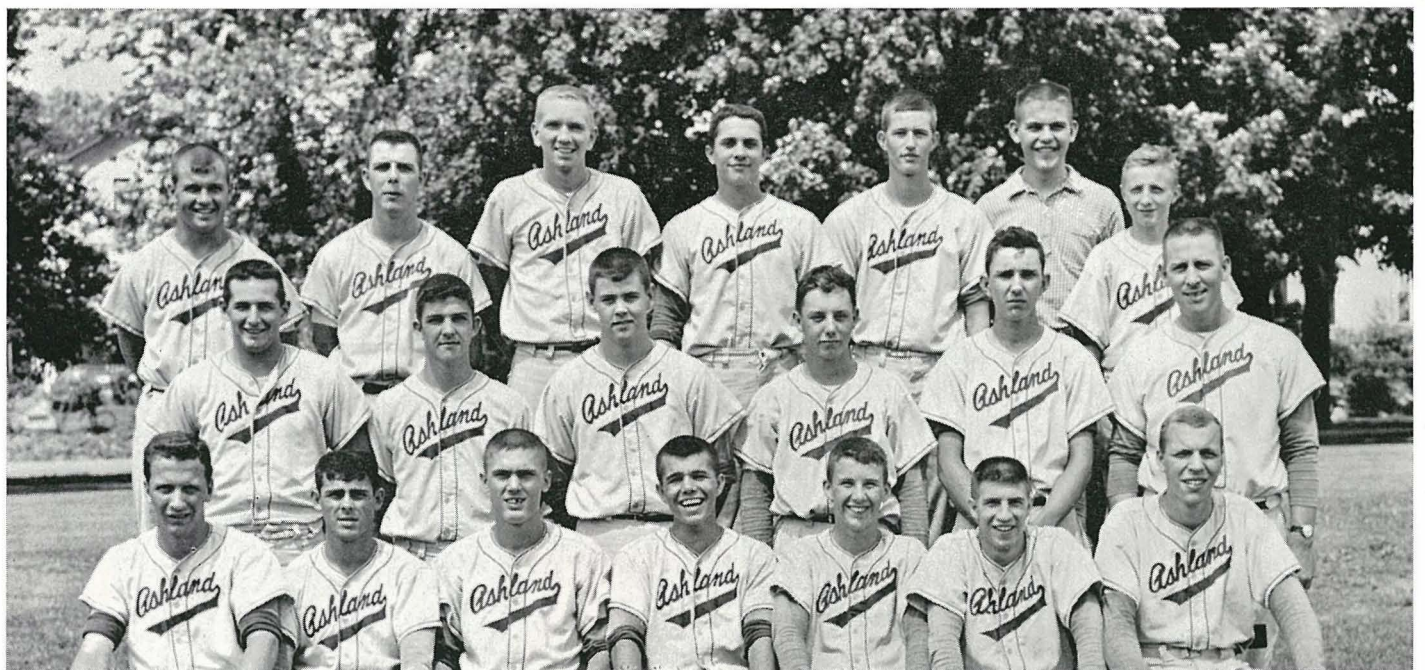

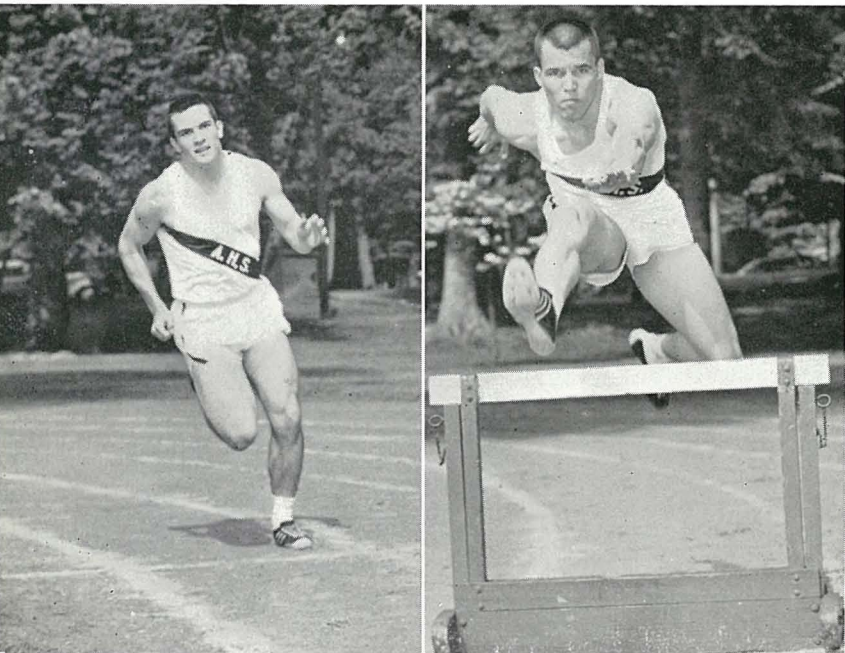
Records fall as thinclads best rivals

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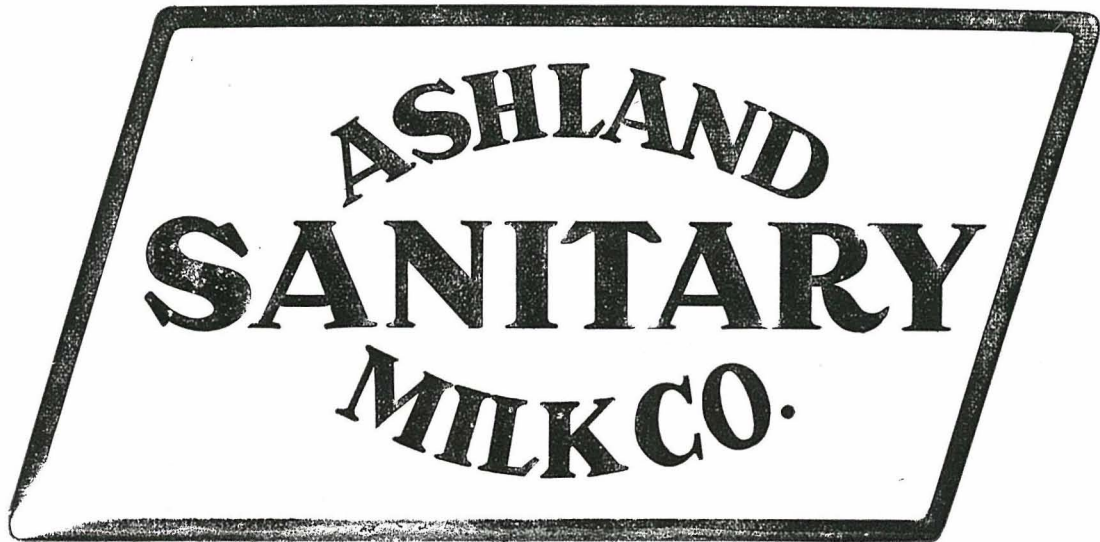
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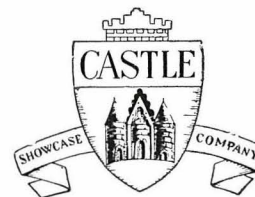
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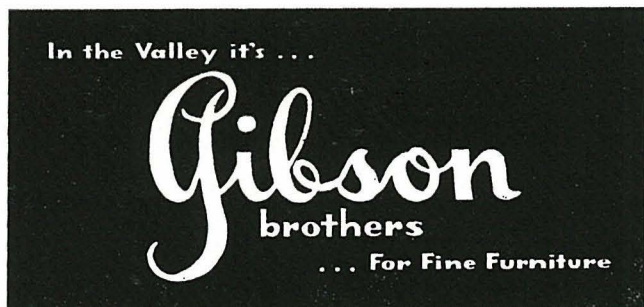
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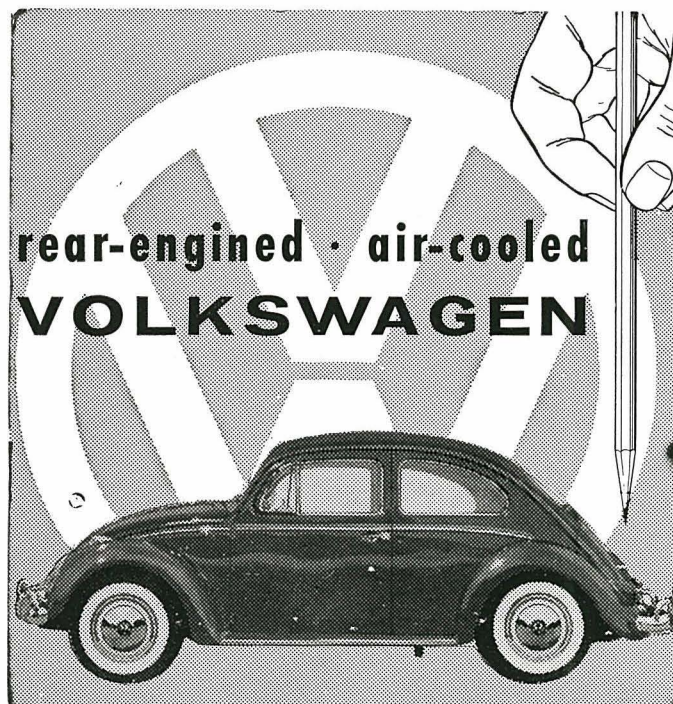
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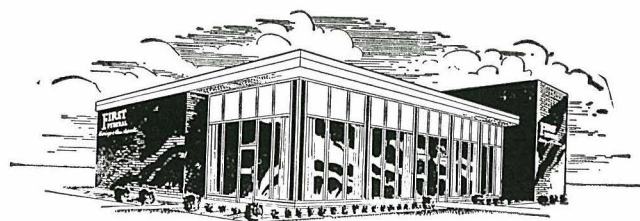
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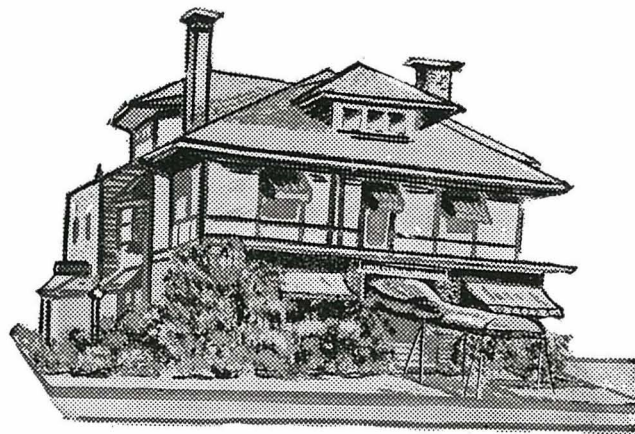
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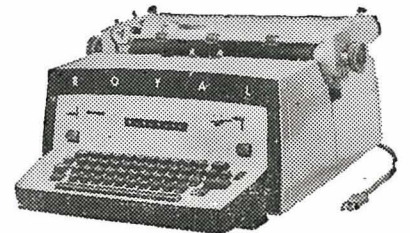
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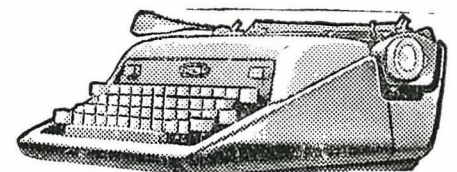
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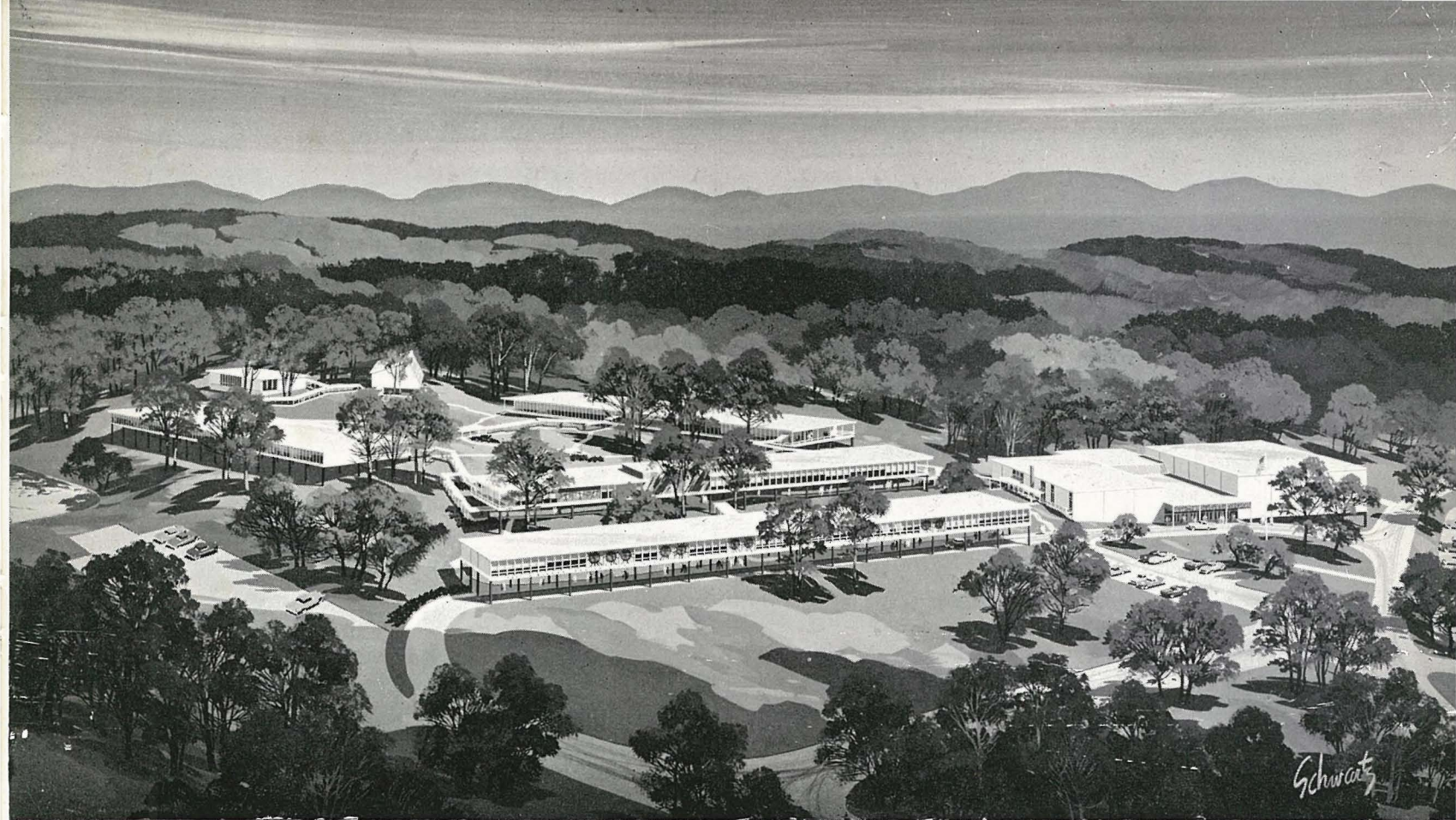
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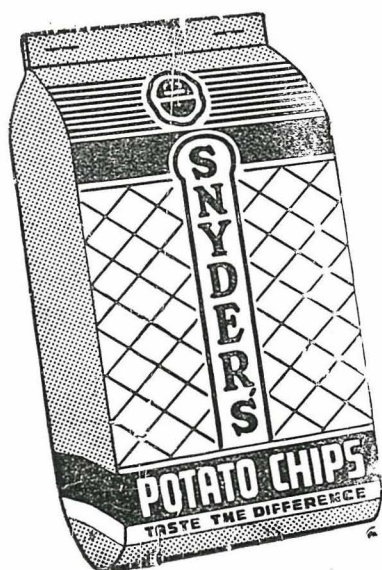
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To the Student Body:

Another one is Mr. J. N. McMillan of the Y. M. C. A., who has been wonderful about taking the pictures of the athletic teams and of the individual players. Another is Mr. Ben McCullough of the Ashland Daily Independent, who could always be relied upon to come up in a pinch with the picture we just had to have.

Needless to say there are the approximately five hundred students who have served on the staffs of these annuals, who each in his individual way has contributed his share to the production of his book, and from whom I have learned many things. There are those members of the faculty who have been so kind when we have disturbed their classes for pictures and who have shown a great deal of cooperation in our efforts to make an outstanding book.

Not many people actually know just how much planning, energy, and time go into the production of a good annual and how little compensation there is for the faculty adviser. I believe the chief recompense comes through the satisfaction of seeing the book grow, of taking an idea and, with the help of all these people, seeing the finished product emerge. I have such a feeling as Nancy, Jane, and I wrap up the dummy and the copy for the '62 annual and mail it to the printer; and I say to myself "Another book is born".

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
