Pvt. Bernard Malloy of the Air corp, is at Kessler Field, Mississippi in the Tech. Paratrooper school.


John Robinson is in the northern part of China. He is the chief engineer of a ship anchored in Sincow, China. John expects to be discharged sometime in June.

Then the Irish went to see what kind of timber St. Patrick had. They said they were better--probably not better just luckier. They won 17-15.


Next we took the long trip to play "Mighty" Fairview, mighty or not, H. F. won 38-12.



We visited ranch (-xxx) Bar 3 x s For it was in the state of Texas


My parents called me Beverly Anna And then they moved me to Montana

On the way back to the cabin five passed the pacing test: William Healy. Donnie Appledorn, James Tierney, Charles Sassin and Frank D'Amico.


At 12:30 the scouts again retired and slept for about four hours.
