The meeting will take place in the library after school and Mrs. Davenport and Miss Fraier hope a large number of ninth grade girls

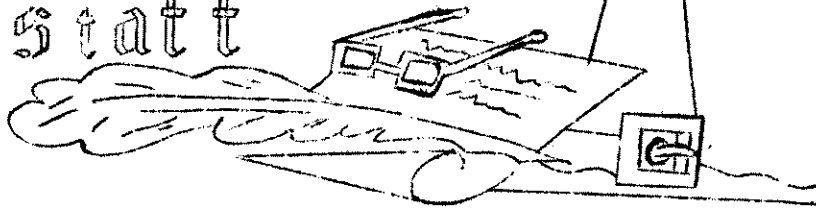
will be present. All the girls in the ninth grade who do not already have two extra curricular activities are eligible for membership.

## BUCCANEERS KEEP TROPHY

### BRONCS WIN OVER SO. P. 6-0

Thursday October 25, the Coles Broncos journeyed to South Point, Ohio where they handed the South Pointers a 6 to 0 defeat.

Coles scored the only touchdown of the game when Don Light recovered a fumble on the South Point 42 yard line. On the first down H. Thompson went around end for 22 yards and T. McPeck bulled his way for 4 yards down to the 14. W. Sutphin then drove for 6, and H. Thompson capped the drive by taking it over for the score. The extra point try was nullified by a backfield in motion penalty.

The play of the Coles line was magnificent as they held South Point to 3 first downs and 28 net yards rushing.

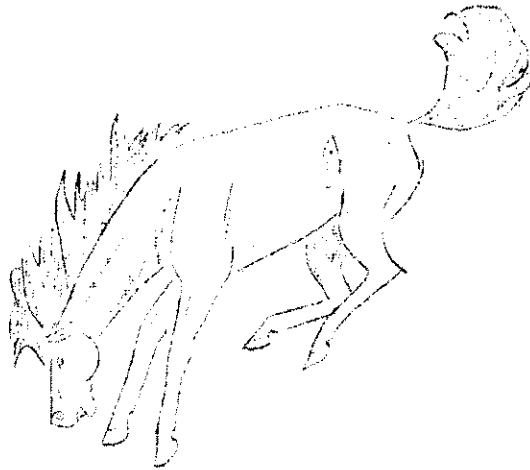
### COLES & PUTNAM WILL JOIN Y- INTRA-MURAL PROGRAM THIS YEAR

Coles and Putnam plan to join with the YMCA to form a basketball league. The league will have three divisions, one each for seventh, eighth, and ninth grades.

Games between the seventh grade teams will be scheduled on Tuesday alternating play from the Putnam to the Coles gym.

The eighth grade will play on Wednesday and the ninth on Thursday.

Practice will be on Monday and Friday at both Coles and Putnam.



### COLES AND PUTNAM TIE 0-0

On November 14, the Coles Broncos battled the favored Putnam Buccaneers to a tie. The contest ended without a score but was exciting all the way as both teams threatened repeatedly. Paul Thompson's Coles squad emerged with a moral victory as the Broncos lost to Putnam earlier in the season, but Putnam kept possession of the Anderson Trophy and had a slight edge in statistics.

Putnam's scoring threats came early in the game. After receiving they started a drive with Sexton and Kouns alternating in carrying the ball. Then on the 22 yard marker the Coles line stiffened and Coles took over on downs. The Broncos failed to gain, however, and Hamilton punted.

Then with Sexton carrying the ball and Kazee passing, the Buccaneers advanced to a first down on the Coles 8 yard line. On the first down Sutphin broke through to throw Sexton for an 8 yard loss. Reliford's pass was short and on third Hamilton intercepted Kazee's pass and ran 38 yards to the 38 yard marker. H. Thompson passed 13 yards to Sutphin and 11 yards to Rupert. A 15 yard penalty against Putnam moved the ball to the Buccaneer's 24 yard line, but before another play could take place, the half ended.

Highley kicked off to start the second half and H. Thompson returned 25 yards. Coles pushed to a first down, but Hamilton's pass was intercepted.

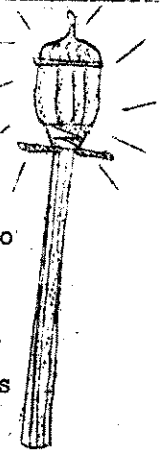

## MATHIS SPEAKS ON YOU & YOUR LUNCH



The other day you took home a letter to your parents telling of the need and the decision to raise the price of the school lunch.

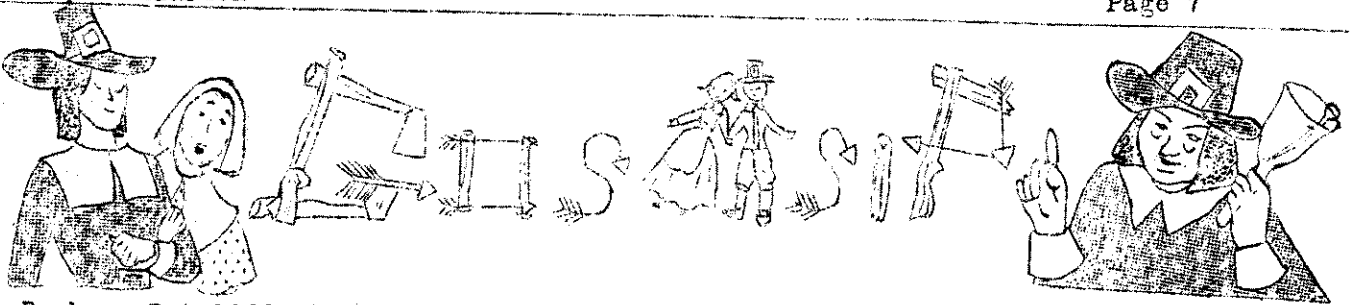
Included on this sheet was a description of the requirements for each lunch. We must meet these requirements in order to receive supplemental funds from the Federal subsidy program. I wonder if you paid any attention to this?

One of the basic purposes of the Federal lunch program is to train boys and girls to eat the proper type of lunch and make the eating of a balanced meal habitual with them. Too many boys and girls have become spoiled. They don't like this or that and aren't going to eat it. No matter how much their parents have tried, no matter how many lessons they have studied in school about proper eating habits, they still believe that if they want to eat just the things that appeal to their taste, they should be permitted to do so.

You know how this is, a big, fat boy or girl wants to eat just the things he or she likes and these are just the things that keep and make him or her too fat.

Well, we are supposed to serve a balanced lunch which consists of a half-pint of milk, two ounces of a protein food, six ounces of vegetables or fruit, two teaspoons of butter or margarine.

We are not supposed to permit you to take double servings of the protein type of food to the exclusion of the vegetable or fruit servings. We are not supposed to permit you double orders of potatoes, pie, and other such foods. If the balanced lunch that the cafeteria ladies have put on the plates is not enough food for you, you may buy extra milk at 6 cents or you may secure another plate lunch. Securing another plate lunch insures that you receive additional food that has proper balance in proteins, carbohydrates, vitamins, etc. We have been taught how to eat. Lets put our teaching into practice.

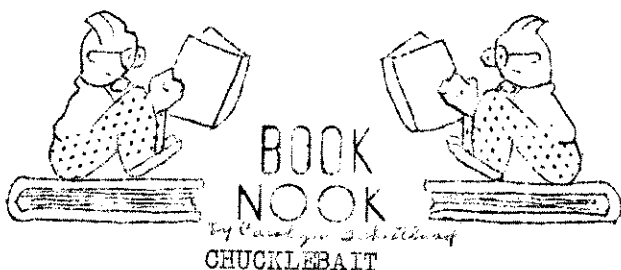

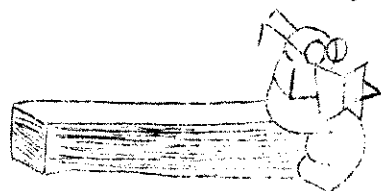
Funny Stories for Everyone
