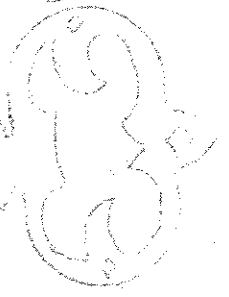

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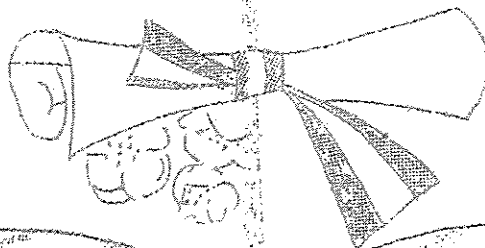

CLASS CHOOSES HILLS AND BYRON B.A.A.

AWARDS TO BE PRESENTED AT COMMENCEMENT

The names of the winners of the ninth grade scholarship awards, have been released by Mr. Mathis. Ninth graders will attend morning classes as scheduled and leave for the Park at 11:30.



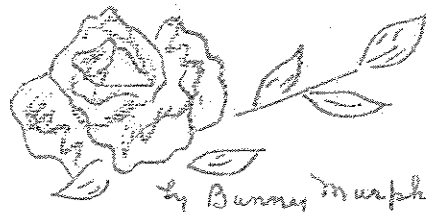
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DID YOU KNOW?

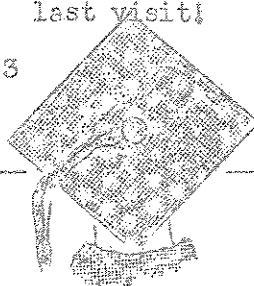
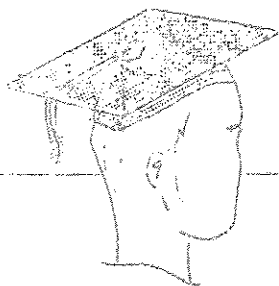

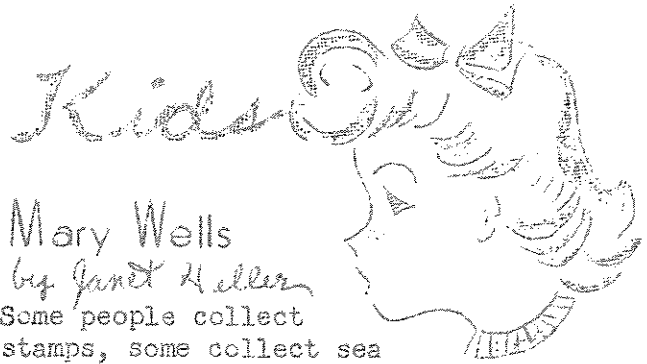
Patty Ann Jayne

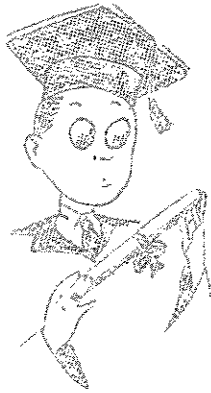

They do this by offering the following program: a recreational program in which the boys can and are encouraged to attend summer camp sponsored by the senior clubs; an educational program, and an athletic program in which the Club sponsored a basketball team in the Y League. They also intend to organize the youth of Coles in order that may arouse the interest of this group in Conservation of the country's natural resources; to cooperate with all officials of law and assist them in the performance of their duties; and to encourage membership in the belief it would not promote better sports but better citizens

The main purpose of the club is to know and recognize wildlife in the community; to make a study of birds, animals and fish; to learn methods of protection and management of wildlife; to learn the value of soil conservation; and to study the

The Band went to Morehead on April 5 to the State Band Contest. Seven of the members rated superior, seventeen excellent, and seven good. The band as a whole was rated "good".

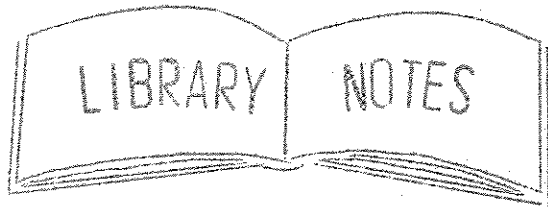
The Clarion Staff extends appreciation to Miss Cooksey for doing such a fine job directing the Coles Band this year.

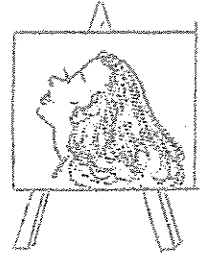

They have done charcoal drawings, pastel pictures, pen and ink sketches, textile work, papier mâché, oil and block prints.

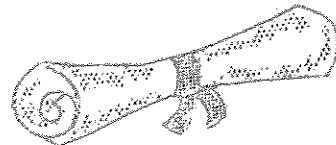

HONOR SOCIETY

The Honor Society is the organization at Coles for students who have been recommended by all members of the school faculty who know them, on the following: scholarship, leadership, character and school citizenship. Each member must be a pupil of the eighth or ninth grade. An impressive induction service is held each year as a school assembly, and parents and friends are invited. The pupil must maintain his B average for if he is off the honor roll for two successive times he is dropped from the society.

This year the Honor Society has sponsored the assembly programs of Teen Talks arranged by the Y. M. C. A. in their Bible Study program. They are also planning to buy a lecturne for the school.

The Coles Chapter of the National Honor Society was organized in 1937-38 by a faculty committee which included Miss Lacie Pennington and Mr. Mathis. It was named in honor of Miss Ida M. Frank, a former Coles teacher, in appreciation of the service she had rendered this school and community.

Membership in this society is one of the highest honors a Coles boy or girl may attain. Honor Society standards are rigid, but students think the honor is worth the effort.

JUNIOR RED CROSS

The Junior Red Cross is the largest organization in Coles since all pupils are members.

The purpose of the J. R. C. is to help boys and girls learn early in life to take their rightful place in the community. It isn't enough for young people to say, "Someday we will give service, but while we are young, we will leave it to the older folks". This habit of service should begin early. Through the activities of the Junior Red Cross, boys and girls are learning to serve in their community.

The Coles organization consists of two pupils, Virginia Sharp and Arnold Holt, who represent the school at the Boyd County meetings held each month at the Henry Clay Hotel. This group decides on the activity which the J. R. C. will take part in each month.

Coles also has a council made up of members from each homeroom. These members take charge of the membership campaign and in filling the gift boxes in their homerooms.

This year has been a very busy one. In October a short and successful membership campaign ending in a 100 per cent enrollment was conducted.

At Christmas time, tray mats, favor nut cups, and party hats, decorated with designs cut from old Christmas cards were made and sent to the Cripple Children's and the Veterans' Hospitals.

In February favors for Washington's Birthday were made.

In March nineteen gift boxes were made which were sent to the less fortunate children of other countries. Each box contained 16 articles including educational items, health items, and toys.

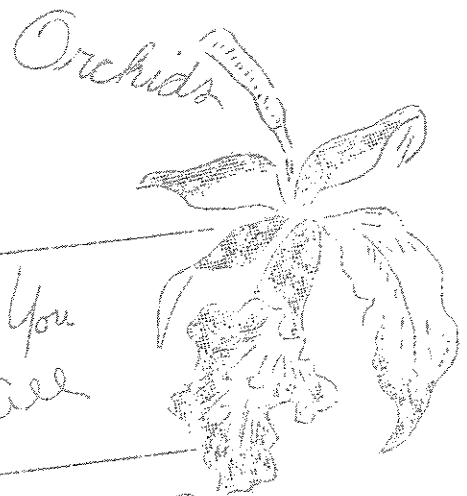
DRAMATIC CLUB

The Dramatic Club was scheduled to give a one act radio play in February, but due to the flu epidemic it had to be postponed.

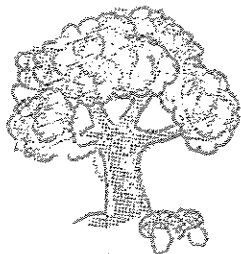
On Wednesday morning, April 2, the members sponsored an assembly program. It consisted of talent in the club.

Arbie-Yes, and from what I've heard the moon people are crazy about them as well as their produce!

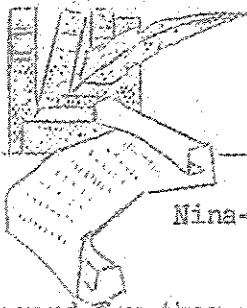
Max-I surely was glad to hear about Chauncey Morris, who bought the moon, recently being elected the Universe's most popular dictator!

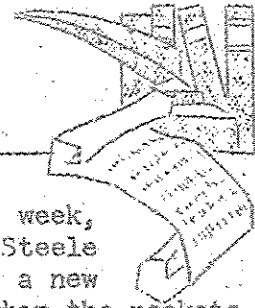

Shirley-And you, Bunny, did you live up to your ambition to marry Farley Granger?

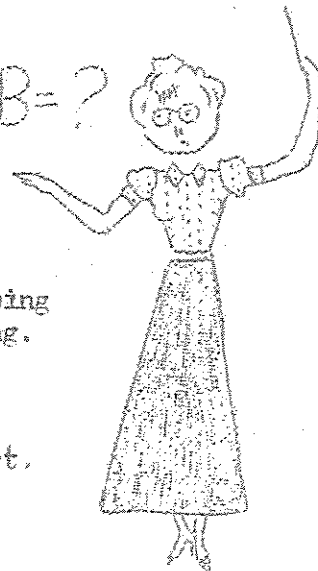
