NAMED FOR MISS COLES

"Listen my children and you shall hear." The history of Coles after thirty years!

NOV 2, 1942

The year 1923 saw a building erected on the corner of thirty-first street and Bath Avenue. The building was Coles Junior High School named after Miss Margaret Coles whose estate furnished money for the building.

COACHES JACKSON & ANDERSON FIRST PRINCIPALS OF COLES

Mr. W. B. Jackson, former coach of the famous Kittens, became principal and was at Coles until 1928 when Mr. James A. Anderson, coach of the famous Tomcats, came to pilot the Koles Kids. During his principalship in 1930, the Coles band was started, under the Director John Lewis.

PROFESSOR J.H. WILLIAMS COMES TO COLES

Mr. John H. Williams took over the reins in 1936 and it was during his stay that the front lawn was landscaped to become the school's greatest pride.

It was also in this year that the Clarion Staff with financial help from a niece of Miss Coles presented the school with the large oil painting of Margaret Coles which hangs in the front hall and is another one of our most cherished possessions.

DEATH OF PROF. WILLIAMS

The death of Mr. Williams, affectionately known as John Henry by the students, was a great tragedy to the school. His brother, Mr. Estill Williams, now principal at Putnam, finished out the school term of 1944-45 and was principal for the year 1945-46. This year a painting of

In the fall of 1946 Mr. Estill's (Williams) stay was cut short and he was transferred to Putnam. Mr. E. W. Mathis who had formerly taught Algebra at Coles and was at that time principal of Charles Russell took Mr. E. Williams' place.

This year tragedy atruck Coles again. Mr. Ben Dawson, custodian for many years, was taken by death.

With Mr. Mathis first year at Coles came changes: Six periods took the place of five and there were two lunch periods instead of one. Offices were changed and renovated and Coles entered a period of waiting and anticipation.

NEW GYM-AUDITORIUM ADDED

The year of 1949 was the big year of In 1942, a sound system was installed Coles History. Coming back to school in September students and faculty were delighted to see classrooms and halls newly painted and decorated, new floor covering in the halls, and fluorescent lights installed in many rooms.

> Then----December 2, 1949 marked the big day in the history of Coles, because it was the opening of the new gym and auditorium to the public. The program was called "Coles Capers" and took the place of the usual Fall Festival. Kids were very proud of the new gym-auditorium with its roll-away bleachers, and its fine stage equipped with beautiful curtains, cyclorama, and footlights.

Also opened at this time was a new cafeteria and industrial arts room and the home ecomonics department was moved (contt. on page 10)



The Coles Clarion, which started out on a shoestring, has come from a small fortnightly edition published by a few Koles Kids interested in the idea to a large monthly paper

that is published by journalism students and has won for two years in succession, a first place rating in the Columbia Press Association Awards.

It all started back in 1933, ten years after Coles was huilt, when pupils of Miss Madge Gambill, then English teacher at Coles, now Mrs. Sparks and a teacher at Ashland Senior High School, investigated the idea of starting a school paper and won her approval of their idea.

The first few issues were called the "Coles Fortnightly" because the paper was published every two weeks, but this name was not considered adequate. So a contest was held with the prize to be a year's subscription to the new paper. Although no actual written record has been found, according to "legend" the name chosen (Coles Clarion) was one suggested by Mrs. Lucian Hackworth, the mother of one one of the Koles Kids of that time. The contest not only brought out a new name for for the paper, but it also increased interest in it.

The first editor of the paper was Vernon Bailey whose father worked on the Ashland Daily Independent and gave the young novices some good advice. Working with Vernon were Archie Rainey, Harry Holmes, and Bill Lyle. This first paper was sold out of the little room where Mr. Mathis! office is now for 2 cents and was mimeographed as it is today. The gossip, then as now, was the most popular feature and the paper's strongest selling point. In fact, enough profits were taken at the end of the first year so that the staff had a party to celebrate!

A few years later Miss Doris Harrell, who now teaches in the Commerce Department at high school but was at that time secretary to the principal, became faculty adviser of the Clarion. After Mrs. Esther Houser took over the job in 1937 and Miss Frazier in 1938, Miss Harrell continued to help with the mimeographing.

In 1937 came the first raise in price from 2 to 3 cents, and in 1939 it was raised to the present 5 cents.

Most of the art work in these early Clarions was original and drawn free hand by the staff artists.

Although today's Clarion has kept much of the old format, i.e. editorial, sports, and activity pages as well as the mast head which dates back to 1938, those early Clarions were really quite different. They were printed on one side of thin paper, in three columns, and without covers. Occasionally cartoons and continued stories appeared.

It was also in 1938 that the first Rose, not a real one but a poem honoring some person connected with the school, was presented.

In 1939 for the first time, wall paper was tried out as a cover, and the first

BAND REVIEW

Oh, me! Oh, my! What a roughtime we've had getting this dope on the band, so you could catch up on the back news! Up to the time Miss Thora Coeksey took over in 1947-48, Coles "Band Notes" were really sketchy! We seemed to be a sort of stepchild of the Senior High Band. Pupils with special talent played with their "Big Brother", but just ordinary tooters, blowers, or rat-a-tat-tatters had band at Coles when the high school director could find time for them. The first of these directors was Mr. John Lewis in 1930 the last was Mr. Carl Reeves. And now we'll let Miss Cooksey tell you in her own words what happened since then.

When I started with the Coles Band in the fall of 1947-48 there were about 20 or 25 in the band. Practices were held in the basement hall until the new cafeteria was built.

Since ther enrollment has increased each year until the number new (1952-53) is 73. A beginners class has been organized which has met as a separate band this year except for marching; both groups are together for parades.

Besides classwork, the band usually marches in one or two parades in the fall, appears at football and basketball games, plays in spring parades and at school assemblies.

During the last five years, students have participated in regional and state music festivals and the whole band has gone for four years! Last year the band presented their first spring concert; this year they presented a joint program with the Glee Club.

Solcists and small ensembles perform from time to time for various groups. A small band is visiting some of the elementary schools this spring to demonstrate to the intermediate children the different kinds of instruments used in the band.

Two of the most helpful changes in the band set-up have happened this year;

- 1. Mr. Mathis arranged the cafeteria tables so that we no longer have to move them twice a day in fixing chairs for practice.
- 2. We have kept a class for first-year students to learn fundamentals.


Well, it isn't quite like that, but the Koles Kids in our Dramatic Club are just as excited and nervous....

We don't know exactly why the Glee Club was started or if there was a reason, but our guess is it was to tame some of the screeching voices in the halls!!! And it really did according to some of the reports from those who heard those early choruses. Of course, not many of you Koles Kids were around when Miss Frances Gleim started the Glee Club back in 1939! But their music, it seems, really was out of this world! Little imps, boys and girls, who reduced their teacher to tears in class, sang and looked like angels when they sang a cappells (maccompanied) in Concerts. Today Miss Gleim is living in Hawaii, where she went after leaving Coles in 1944.



In April of 1943 the Glee Club let their melodious voices be heard at the King's Daughters' Hospital. In October 1945 the boys again became interested in singing, so a boys chorus was organized.

April 1946 saw the first operetta, "In Grand Old Switzerland" presented by the Coles Glee Club under the direction of Miss Thora Cooksey, who is now the Coles band director.

Another operetta "Greig's Music Box" was given in March 1947 under the direction of Mrs. Kathryn Pennington. Mrs. Pennington also directed two other operetta s one, "The Band Wagon" in January 1948, the other called "Hearts and Blossoms" in March 1949. In May 1948, also under the direction of Mrs. Pennington, a colorful spring concert was given in the Ashland High School Auditorium. Mrs. Tom Kentner comes next in the series of music teachers at Coles. A Christmas Cantata, an operetta, Pinocchio, radio, P. T. A., and assembly programs, were presented under her direction in the year 1949-50.

In 1951 Mrs. Kentner directed a minstrel called "Big Bandanna Band", a Christmas Cantata, and in May the lovely "Spring Follies". She gave up her teaching career in 1952 to become a second lieutenant in the Waves. Mrs. Helen Greer Myers, who directs music at senior high school, completed the year's work.

Rounding out fourteen years of beautiful music the Coles Chorus sang for the P. T. A. at Christmas this year.

Many times we have heard their harmonious voices under the direction of Miss Whitehurst in assembly.

On May 3 with the Coles Band they presented a Spring Concert in the Coles Auditorium. May 27, at Commencement they will make their last appearance this year.



HONOR SOCIETY

Does she (or he) measure up to the tests of character, scholar to, service, and leadership? Does she (or he) create loyal pupil citizenship, and stimulate a desire to serve

faithfully her (or his) school? Does she (or he) have a B or better average? If so then she (or he) would be eligible to become a member of the Ida May Frank National Honor Society organized in 1937.

Miss Ida M. Frank for whom the Society was named was at that time teaching at Coles. She began her teaching career in a rural two room school after which she taught at Bayless, Cld Central High School (now Crabbe), and Wylie. Miss Frank stayed at Coles until her retirement in 1942. Unwilling to give up her teaching to which she had devoted her life, Miss Frank started a private school at her home. After two years, however, she was stricken with paralysis. After that she remained a helpless invalid until her death in September of 1948.

The first faculty council consisted of Miss Lacie Pennington, Miss Edith Burke, and Mr. E. W. Mathis,

On December 12, 1949, a new club was organized at Coles. Its sponsor was Mr. Creech and it was organized under the leadership of Mr. Robert Bebber, a representative of the Kentucky Fish and Game Association. The following officers were elected at the first meeting: David Mosser, president; Jimmy Stewart, vice president; Bill McClanahan, secretary and treasurer.

The primary purpose of the club is to teach boys the value of conserving natural resources and wildlife. Monthly meetings are held under the supervision of the Northeastern Fish and Game Association. At these meetings movies on wildlife and conservation are shown. Excellent talks were made this year by Mr. Henson- Mr. Bebber.

Mr. Roy Smith has backed the club from the beginning and has secured many privileges for them. The Conservation Club has had no outings this year, but the boys are planning several hunting and fishing trips. In October Mr. Rice, sponsor of the club, announced the election of the following officers for the year: pres., Ronnie Waldron; Vice pres., Danny Griggs; treas., David Rigsby; sec., Charles McDonald; reporter, David Stewart; and Sergeant at arms, Gilbert Layman.

The Coles Chapter of the National Junior Red Cross was organized during the school year of 1940-41 with Miss Wilma Becknell as sponsor. During that year the members made tray covers for the veterans. To raise money they made spool dolls. In the summer they gave swimming lessons.

The 1941-42 school year began with Jean O'Neil, president, and Jo Ann Stewart, vice president. Two movies "Kentucky" and "Adventure with Chico" were sponsored by the club to raise money for over-seas boxes.

In the 1942-43 school year Jackie Shelow was president. While she was in office the J. R. C. made menu covers, soldier utility kits, and had a stunt in the Roman Holiday. That year Mrs. Eliza Cooksey, now a teacher at Ashland Senior High School, was sponsor.

In the year 1943-44 the members made joke books for men overseas. In 1944-45 and 45-46 book reviews were sent to service men. Throughout these years the J. R. C. kept its 100 percent membership unbroken. In 1946-47 the industrial arts boys made games and a ping-pong table. In addition some overseas boxes were filled.

In 1947-48 all rooms at Coles were again 100 percent in membership. Mrs. Kathryn Pennington was sponsor in the school year 1949-50 and Mrs. Guyn in 1950-51. During 50-51 the Junior Red Cross made tray covers, favors, nut cups, and wall decorations for the veterans hospital at Christmas time. For the February project the homerooms filled ten J. R. C. gift boxes.

The Junior Red Cross activities for the school year 1951-52 were filling boxes for children in schools in other countries and making Easter bonnets for the young children in different hospitals.

This has been a special year for the Coles Junior Red Cross. For the first time since Mrs. Guyn became sponsor in 1950 the organization has surpassed its quota of 18 boxes and filled 22. Also for the first time the J. R. C. has received a letter thanking them for their boxes. Below is part of the letter exactly as it was written from a boy in Japan:



Williams to discuss starting a boys! club at Coles.

The end of the year two girls were selected to go to Y-Teen conference at Quebec, March 1946--The had a tea for Miss Harriet Tennessee. entertainment. October 1946-Miss Marybelle Laufenburg became sponsor, assisted by Mrs. Davenport, Mrs. Cole, and Miss Polly Thompson.

November 1946--The play "Hi Neighbor" was given under the direction of Miss Thompson. December--1946--Annual Recognition Service at Baptist Church. 1947-- Dropped until January.--Reorganized by Miss Laufenburg with new sponsor, Ceres Geiger.

1948--Divided into two groups because of so many girls. The work for this year consisted of figure painting and bracelet making. A party was given for the ninth grade Y-Teens by the seventh and eighth graders. . . Miss Luafenburg presented and the Wolf"... . . An outing was held at Roadside Park in Ohio. . . 1949-50-The first meeting was held on October 3. On this date they elected officers. They had a Halloween party at the YWCA. A Christmas party was held at the Ramey Home. The girls took presents, sang songs, and amused the small children. New officers were elected the second semester. At the end of the year two girls were selected to go to Y-Teen conference at Quebec, LaVera Hatten. (Con't. on page 20)

In 1937 the first meeting of a new born club was held on Thursday October 7, at 3:30 in room 13. At that meeting they christened this club the "Capitolium". The membership for that year was 17 members, all students of first year Latin. . . . During this year the initiation was to wear a Roman Costume and be the slave of an older member of the club. (This was in the days of first and second semesters when a beginning Latin Class started at mid-term or year.). . . . From 1938-1943 the Latin Club had many Roman Holidays and Roman dinners. During the year of the members of the club, to see what their children had been doing while they were taking Latin at Coles. .

In 1944 as usual they had their Christmas Pageant, but his year it was unusual because it was held in Mrs. Pennington's homeroom, instead of in a church. At the close of school in 1945 there was a treat for the students, a swimming party. . . . During '46, '47, '48, they presented programs at P. T. A. . . . In 1950 for the first time since the club was organized there was no Roman Holiday. . .

APR. 17, 1950

The first record of art classes at Coles is found in the 1940-47 Clarions. Making me nu folders for the Junior Red Cross to send to Veterans Hospitals was the worthwhile project of that year. "Madame Artist" of Coles in '47 and '48 was Miss Janet O'Leary, who came from high school and taught two classes at Coles. Talented Coles artists under her supervision made a booklet to exchange through the Red Cross with school children in Poland. Other activities included painting textiles, still-life, portraits and landscapes.

In 1948-149 and part of 150 and 151, classes of Mrs. Betty Hensley made puppets sketched out-door life and buildings, painted each other's portraits, made Christmas cards, soap carvings, and papier maché articles.

In 1951 Mrs. Kathryn Pennington tock over the art classes. Excellent charcoals, pastels, pen and ink sketches, textile work, papier mache trays, clay modeling, and block prints were displayed in an exhibit April 25 at the Kentucky West Virginia Power Company.

This year (1953) was another successful one for Mrs. Pennington's art students. An exhibit spensored by the Second National Bank, was held at the Better Homes Show, May 7, 8, and 9. Work on display included pastels, oils and art crafts.





The Coles library was started about 1939 with a donation of books and encyclopedias from the Margaget Coles family. At that time it occupied the large rooms upstairs where Miss Frazier's and Miss Taylor's rooms are now.

NOV.15,1948 There was no regular librarian but a study hall teacher would come in each period. The approximate 100 books of those days has been increased today to well over 3,000.

Many of the books were old editions unsuited to teen-age readers. Now they have anything from baseball to "boy dates girl".

After each period the teacher was to see that all the books were placed back on the shelves and the cards were placed in order. Today the library has changed greatly. Mrs. Davenport, the regular librarian, is in room 10 at all times to help students who wish to use the library for reference or pleasure. Every period a different boy or girl comes in to act as library assistant for that period.

The big event of the year is Book Week which is held each year in November. During this week boys and girls try to read as many books as they can. A special assembly is given with such noted guest speakers as Jesse Stuart, book quizzes, etc.*

The library has been used more this year than ever before—by seventh graders. On the average about 150 books are checked out each day. The library now also has many magazines and eight sets of encyclopedias. The first librarian at Coles was Miss Wilma Becknell in 1941. She was followed by Miss Dorothy Winans, who served only a few months. Miss Nancy Walthall then became librarian for about two years. Following Miss Walthall was Miss Womack who was librarian for a few months. Mrs. Davenport has been librarian for nearly four years.



PROGRESSIVE CLUB & Dom 2 journey



The Coles "Broncos" saw the light of day in 1929 under the leadership of Coach Ramey. Their history since that time can be chiefly summed up in the record of their rivalry with Putnam.

It was in November 1936, the year Putnam was built, NOV. 371941 that the first game was played between the Coles Broncos and the new Putnam "Buccaneers". Coles won this game (6-0) and became City Champs in football.

In 1937 with Fayne Grone as coach, the "Broncos" were again "Champs" and victors over Putnam (14-0).

However, in 1938 the Putnam Buccaneers turned the tables, defeating the Broncos by a 13-to 0 score.

Why there's the "Sealtest Big Top" and that's Gilbert Layman who has taken Sealtest Dan, the muscle man's.place!



Priscilla M.—Yes, Mademoiselle, tell us what you see. There are many Koles Kids whom we still haven't been able to trace.....




I see Ronnie Waldron is still up in the air! This time in a balloon headed for the planet Pluto!!!




Signor Spotyou: I'm sure they will. Their truths are infallible.



Several popular columns still in today's Clarion had their beginning at about this time——The Book Nook, 1940——Kisses and Kicks and Coles Classified in 1943.


The first "super" ninth grade edition was the Brain Child of Dorothy Lewis in 1945. It contained 26 pages and sold for 10 cents. Todays edition numbers 42 pages not counting title pages, ads, etc. and sells for 25 cents. On its front and back covers are small reproductions of the covers of old Ninth grade editions of the Coles Clarion. The title pages are reproductions of regular Clarion covers of past years and the heading for all the pages are also taken from old Clarion covers. The dates tell the story! Truly, the Clarion has had a colorful history.

To supplement the history of the Clarion we've asked Miss Frazier to tell about some of the things she remembers.

Today's staff has many advantages over those of the early days—Then, there was no journalism class or Clarion period.but all work was done outside school hours...

. There was only one mimeoscope and now we have three. . There was no slip—sheeter for the mimeograph so slip sheets (old Clarion pages) were put in by hand. In spite of these disadvantages, the Clarion for years was published every two weeks and during part of this time Junior High students did all the typing! If you'll read some of those early Clarions, however, I think you'll agree it was a good paper even if I did have to learn the mysteries of mimeoscopes and mimeographs from the students themselves. . . But there was in the staff a feeling of responsibility——and pride. . . They had a job to do! The Clarion must come out every two weeks—and on time even if it meant sacrificing personal pleasures. This was their job and they did it!!! They made the Clarion what it is today—and they gained for more in character development and skills than they lost in pleasure, rest, or sleep.
